CHRISTIAN SCIENCE CHURCHES

"Is the Universe, Including Man, Evolved by Atomic Force?" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, June 20.

Gasoline—"A" book coupons No. 6, good for four gallons each outside the eastern gasoline shortage area.

Sugar—Coupon No. 13 good for 5 pounds through August 15. Coupons Nos. 15 and 16 are good through October 31 for 5 pounds each for home canning purposes. Housewives may apply to their local ration boards if necessary.

Coffee—Stamp No. 24 (1 lb.) is good through June 30.

Fuel Oil—Period 5 coupons valid in all zones until September 30.

Shoes—Stamp No. 18 (1 pair) became valid June 16.

Meats, etc.—Red stamps, J. K. L. M, good through June 30. N becomes valid June 20.

Processed Foods—Blue stamps K, L, M, continue good through July 7.
