Wrong Kind of Rubbish Placed In Salvage Boxes

Too much of the wrong kind of rubbish is being placed in the salvage boxes at the railroad stations and schools, states Mrs. Nathan Corwith, acting chairman of conservation for Highland Park.

Only rubber, iron, all kinds of metals and rags should be deposited in the boxes. All these are urgently needed for refabrication into munitions and defense material. The Office of Civilian Defense urges that every scrap should be saved for the salvage boxes.

No Other Materials
No other salvage materials should be placed in the boxes, as sorting them out slows down the city trucks' collection work.

Tin cans should be put out for the garbage collector on the day of collection, to prevent rusting. Grease will be paid for by all butchers. Bottles should be taken only to the box in front of Fell's store or the hospital.
