Do's and Don'ts For Water Safety

Over 80 million people participated in water sports last summer and in the Chicago area alone 125 persons lost their lives because of carelessness. Most of the drownings occurred at non-supervised swimming places. The Red Cross Water Safety Program, which has reduced the drowning rate from 10.2 per 100,000 population in 1914, to 5.1 per 100,000 population at the present time, lists the following simple precautions to avoid fatal accidents:

- DON'T** swim too soon after meals. (The usual result — stomach cramps and drowning.)
DO wait at least two to three hours after meals before going swimming.
- DON'T** swim alone.
DO swim with a "Buddy."
- DON'T** plunge into water. (This causes shock)
DO wade into water waist deep and gradually cook the body to prevent shock.
- DON'T** take long swims alone. (Exhaustion and panic are "Fifth Columnists" in the water)
DO take long swims but be escorted by a good boatsman and an expert swimmer to keep a watchful eye on you.
- DON'T** swim at unguarded beaches.
DO swim at safe and guarded beaches.
- DON'T** leave and upset canoes or boats.
DO stay with upset canoes or boats — they don't sink.
- DON'T** attempt to make a rescue alone.
DO use buoyant materials such as boats, boards, ring buoys, torpedo buoys, etc.
- DON'T** dive into strange waters.
DO examine bottoms before you dive and make sure the water is at least 10 feet deep; if diving from a 3 meter board and at least 15 feet deep; if diving from a height greater than 3 meters.
- DON'T** sit in the sun unexposed for long periods.
DO cover up and take the sun gradually. Turn over at 15 min-

Blood Donations Asked By Chicago Red Cross Chapter

Chicago is falling behind in furnishing 5,000 pints of blood per week, the quota demanded by the army and navy.

This announcement was made by Joseph H. King, chairman of Blood Donor service, Chicago chapter of the American Red Cross. Mr. King went on to say that, while up to the present time the need for blood plasma has been great, this need will inevitably become greater when the invasion of Europe by our armed forces takes place.

Last week the Chicago Blood Donor service was 500 pints short of its quota. The seriousness of this critical situation cannot be over-emphasized. Wounded men cannot wait for plasma transfusions. If they are to be given their chance to live plasma must be there!

The Red Cross is asking for more
