Casualties of the United States Armed Forces from the outbreak of the war to July 3 total 91,644. This total, based on War and Navy Department reports, includes: Dead, 16,696; wounded, 21,828; missing, 31,579; prisoners of war, 21,541. Of these, Army casualties total 64,621; Navy, 27,023.

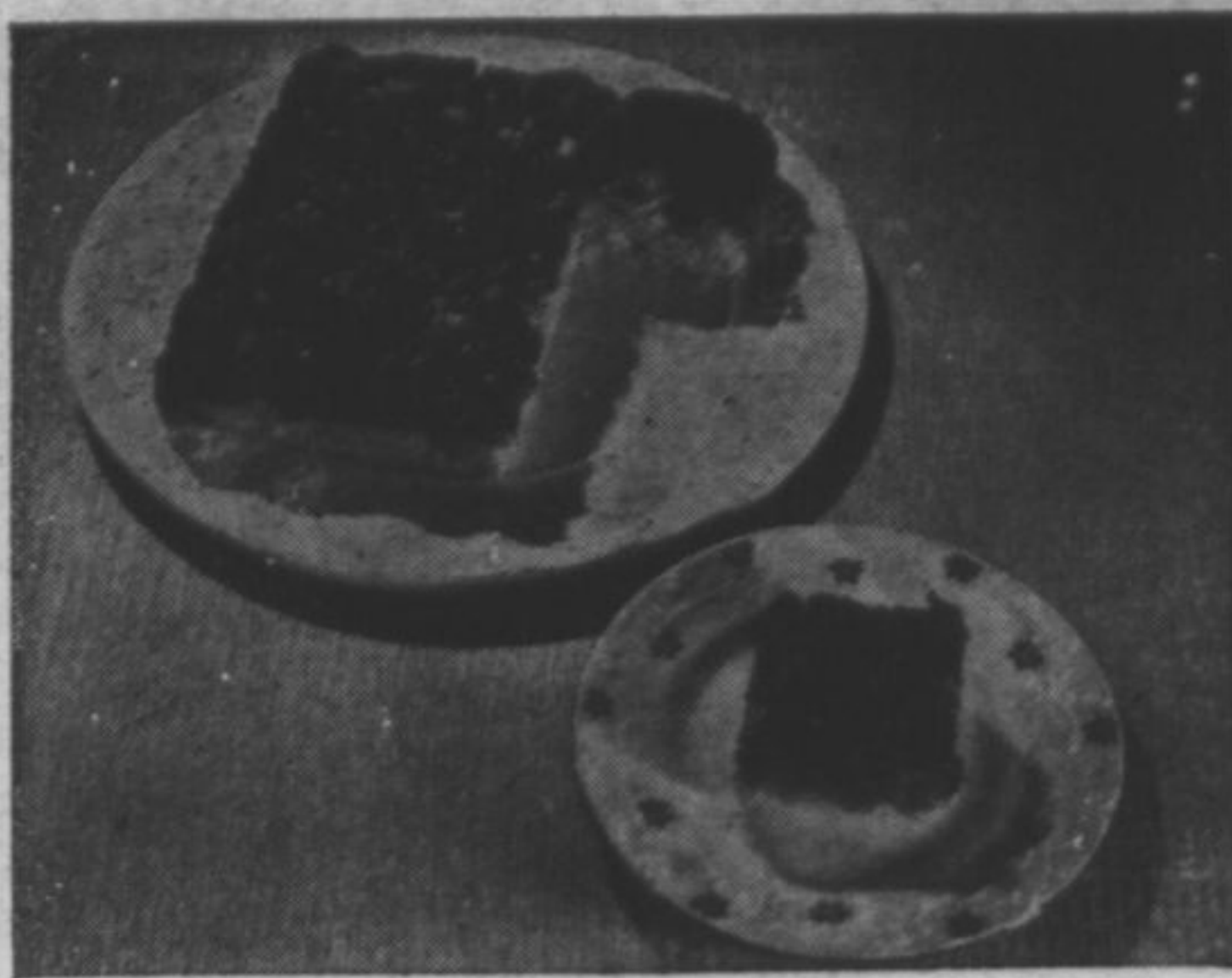
Upon completion of the course, Miss Allen will be enlisted in the army nurse's corps. This is the first Highland Park organization to sponsor such a program.

## CHERRY COFFEE CAKE

### CHERRY COFFEE CAKE

Prepare pan for coffee cake as follows:

- 1/4 cup butter or margarine
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 cups drained canned or fresh pitted cherries

Melt butter or margarine in pan (8"x8"x2"). Sprinkle sugar over bottom of pan and cover with cherries.

Pour following batter over cherries:

- 2 cups sifted enriched flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 3 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup shortening
- 1 egg
- 1 cup milk

Sift together flour, salt, baking powder, and sugar. Cut or rub in shortening. Beat egg. Add milk and add to dry ingredients. Mix only until flour is moistened. Pour over cherries in prepared pan. Bake in moderately hot oven (400°F.) 25 minutes.

Yield: 1 coffee cake, 8"x8".

### BEST BUY THIS WEEK

Cabbage is always a top ranking vegetable as far as vitamins are concerned, but right now it is also tops among the list of best war-time food buys. Quality is excellent and, the greener the cabbage the richer it is in vitamins A, B, C and G. Also in liberal supply are home-grown beets, peppers, celery, green onions and radishes. War-time food shoppers are urged to take advantage of these items while they are in heavy supply and to let none of them go to waste. The civilian supply of food is large enough for health and strength for all, but not for waste. Other popular vegetables are becoming scarcer, such as carrots, snap beans and such greens as spinach, mustard and turnip tops. Asparagus has practically disappeared from the market as the season is over. One welcome newcomer to the market this week is sweet potatoes, but like all first offerings they are high priced. Irish potatoes, however, are as plentiful as they were scarce several weeks ago and prices are within reach of even limited food budgets.

Although prices of all kinds of fruit remain high, there is quite a variety to choose from. Cantaloupes are lower priced this week, partly because so many of them are over-ripe. A similar situation exists in limes, many of these showing yellow. All kinds of berries are in smaller supply this week and so are peaches, but there are plenty of Transparent and Duchess apples coming from Illinois.
