## Budapest String Quartet to Close Ravinia Concerts

The Budapest String Quartet, one of the world's foremost ensembles, opens Ravinia's final week Tuesday evening, August 10, with the first of a series of four chamber music concerts after George Szell rounds out his last week of conducting the Chicago Symphony orchestra, August 8.

The chamber music concerts will

be held Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday evenings at 8:30 p. m. and Sunday afternoon at 4 o'clock. Except for boxes, there will be no reserved seats.

An assisting artist will appear with the quartet at three of the four concerts. Szell will step down from the podium to appear with the quartet Tuesday evening, August 10, playing Mozart's Piano Quartet, E Flat Major (Kochel 493). Szell, who directed the Chicago Symphony during the fifth and sixth weeks of the Ravinia festival, made his first public appearance at the age of 11 as a pianist with the Vienna Symphony orchestra. During the next few years he made a number of important appearances but soon realized his ambition to be a conductor.

Dudley Powers, cellist with the Chicago Symphony orchestra since 1933 will appear on the Saturday night, August 14, program to play the Cello Quintet C Major, Opus 163, by Schubert. Powers was formerly a member of the Mischakoff String Quartet and has been a member of the Philharmonic String Quartet. He studied with Emanuel Feuermann, and the Juillard Foundation. He is 32 years old.

Milton Preves, a member of the Chicago Symphony orchestra, will appear with the Quartet Sunday afternoon, August 15, playing the Viola Quintet C Major, Opus 29, by Beethoven and the Viola Quintet E Flat Major, Opus 57, by Dvorak. Preves, who has been with the Chicago Symphony since 1934, was made principal viola player of the orchestra in 1939. He has appeared as soloist several times at Ravinia and during the winter season with the Chicago Symphony orchestra. He is 34 years old.

The quartet will present a complete program of Beethoven's compositions on Thursday evening, August 12. They will present String Quartet B Flat Major, Opus 18, No.

The Budapest String Quartet, which has played over one thousand concerts, is composed of Josef Roisman and Alexander Schneider, violins; Boris Kroyt, viola, and Mischa Schneider, cello. The group has toured Europe extensively, as well as Australia, Africa, the Dutch Indies and ten parts of the United States.

This is the fourth year that chamber music has been featured at the Ravinia festival. It was introduced in 1940 by the Pro Arte Quartet and a similar series was presented in 1941 and 1942 by the Budapest String Quartet.

The quartet will present varied programs from the pages of chamber music literature, including works of Haydn, Mozart, Schubert, Dvorak, Beethoven, Borodin and Mendelssohn.
