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Set Quota For Third War Loan For City At \$712,000

Over 100 committee chairmen from Lake County were present Monday night at a meeting held in the Central school, Libertyville, to complete plans for the third War Loan drive scheduled to start Sept. 9.

Representing Highland Park was Niels Clausen, in the absence of the general chairman, George Hartman. A. E. Patton has been named chairman of the drive for Highland Park.

Quotas were assigned to each city, with Highland Park's quota being \$712,000. Of this amount, \$368,000 is in E bonds.

Lake County is divided into four sections for the selling of war bonds and stamps, with Highland Park being in section D. This includes Highland Park, Deerfield, Highwood, Prairie View, Lake Zurich and Barrington.

It will be a house-to-house canvass and plans for Highland Park's part in the drive will be announced in the near future.

Presiding at the meeting was James F. Stiles, Jr., of Abbott laboratories, Lake County chairman. Eugene W. Kaspar, deputy administrator of the war savings staff of the U. S. treasury department was present.

Plan Entertainment For Men Home From Overseas Duty

A city-wide project consisting of entertainment for service men home on leave from overseas duty was discussed by members of several Highland Park clubs and organizations at a meeting held Tuesday noon at the Open House tearoom.

Representatives at the meeting, which was called by Paul Behanna of the Rotary club, were Mayor Joseph Garnett, Harry Eichler of the American Legion, Art Swanson, commissioner of streets, E. A. Belmont, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, and Frank Wichman of the Highland Park high school.

It is planned to entertain service men by inviting them to luncheons, dinners and entertainment given by clubs. At a meeting called for Tuesday, Sept. 7, at the Open House tearoom at 12:15 o'clock, it is requested that secretaries of all organizations interested in taking part in this project be present.

A city-wide reception committee will be formed at the meeting, with the secretary of each club to act as chairman of the entertainment committee. At that time, a permanent committee will be formed, in the hopes of continuing the entertainment plan until the last boy returns from the war.

It is planned to limit the entertainment to boys returning only from battle zones overseas. Cited as examples were the homecoming of Pfc. Bill Lorimer and Capt. John McMahon, both of the marine corps, who are expected home in the near future.

In order that no boy is overlooked, the cooperation of all Highland Park organizations is requested. The project is open to all and all are invited to be present at the next meeting in

Oak Terrace School to Open Wednesday, Sept. 8

District 107 Pupil's Should Register Friday and Saturday

The Elm Place and Green Bay Road schools, District 107, will open on Wednesday, Sept. 8, at 9 a. m. Pupils should report to last year's home home rooms.

Kindergarten pupils for both schools should register in the kindergarten rooms on that morning, provided they did not register last spring. All kindergarten pupils must be five years old on or before December 31, 1943. Parents should bring birth certificates for registration.

It will again be necessary to have two sessions of the kindergarten both at Elm Place and at Green Bay Road schools. Children whose birthdays are between January 1 and June 30 will attend the afternoon session. Children whose birthdays are between July 1 and December 31 will attend the morning session. These kindergarten children should report for their respective sessions on Thursday, September 9.

New pupils above kindergarten should register on Friday or Saturday morning, Sept. 3 or 4, in the main office at the Elm Place school.

Textbooks for all children from grades one through eight may be purchased at the Elm Place school book store on Friday, Sept. 3, between 9 a. m. and 4 p. m., on Saturday morning, Sept. 4, between 9 and 12 a. m., or on Tuesday, Sept. 7. All books should be secured before school opens.

Anticipate 1150 Students In Fall Term At Local High School

Four Schools In District 108 to Open on Wednesday

The schools of District 108, Lincoln, Ravinia, Braeside and West Ridge, will open on Wednesday, Sept. 8, at 9 a.m. This session on Wednesday will be a registration session and children will remain at school only from 9 to 10 o'clock.

At this time, children will be given a list of books and materials needed and certain plans for the school year will be discussed with them. On Thursday morning the regular session of classes will begin. All parents are urged, however, to have children attend the Wednesday session as this will aid in arranging materials, schedules and the like.

Several new teachers have been added to the staff of District 108 for the coming year. Darrell R. Beam will assume the duties of principal at Braeside school succeeding Mrs. Ethel Elder who resigned during the summer. Mr. Beam has been an assistant principal in the elementary schools in Des Moines, Iowa, for the past five years. He holds a Master's degree from Drake university, Des Moines, Iowa, where he has specialized in the skills subject programs. He has been an active member of the Des Moines school committee on recreation and community affairs.

Miss Ann Caldwell will serve as social studies teacher in the Braeside school. Miss Caldwell is a graduate of Northwestern university, having a Master's degree from this school. She has been employed previously in the public schools of Boulder, Colo.

Two new fourth grade teachers, Mrs. Harriet Rose and Mrs. Ruth Simpson, have been added at the Braeside school. Mrs. Simpson has previously taught in the public schools at Brookfield, Ill., and Mrs. Rose in the Sunset Ridge school in Northfield. The first grade teacher at Braeside will be Mrs. Katherine Holmgren. Mrs. Holmgren holds a Master's degree from Northwestern university in primary education and taught in the public schools of Evanston, Ill., and Toledo, Ohio, before coming to Highland Park.

A new music teacher has been employed to take the place of Mrs. Katherine Wilson. Mrs. Ruth Guesche will handle vocal music at the Braeside and Ravinia schools. Mrs. Guesche holds a Master's degree in public school music from Northwestern university. Previous to coming to Highland Park she worked in the 9th grade at Joliet Township high school. Earl Stricker, who has previously handled the bands at Lincoln and West Ridge, will this year have charge of all instrumental music in the four schools.

Miss Ella Rasmussen, who formerly taught in the schools of Highwood, will handle art work in Braeside and Ravinia schools.

Opening Teachers' Meetings
In starting the program for the school year, a series of teachers' meetings will be held in District 108. These will be held on the Tuesday preceding the opening of school. At this time, plans for the year will be outlined and matters of school organization arranged. P.T.A. officials will be introduced at this opening session and R. R. Wible, president of the board of education, will speak to the teachers on behalf of the board. Following the opening teachers' meetings, a tea will be held in the afternoon for the school staff.

Approximately 1,150 students are expected when the Highland Park high school begins its new term in September, according to Dr. Harold Spears, principal. Three hundred will come in to offset the loss of last June's graduating class of 260.

Dr. Spears reports that the school does not anticipate a noticeable loss of older boys and girls staying out to work, as has been the case in industrial communities. However, just as last year, a large percentage of the students are expected to carry part-time jobs while going to school. Where necessary, time adjustment in the student's school program will be made to facilitate outside work.

The seven new faculty members are distributed thus: Three in boys' physical education, one in girls' physical education, one in dramatics and speech, one in commerce, and the cafeteria director.

First Week's Schedule

The schedule for the first week is as follows:

Tuesday, Sept. 7—The faculty planning day, with a meeting of the entire faculty called for 3 p. m.

Wednesday, Sept. 8—Freshmen only will report for work at 8:45 a. m.

Thursday, Sept. 9—The upper classmen will report for classes at 8:45 a. m., freshmen will report at 9:45, and regular school will continue from then on.

Book Store Schedule

The high school book store, handling new and used books, will be open on Friday, Sept. 3, from 9 to 12, from 1 to 3, and again on Saturday, Sept. 4, from 9 to 12. Padelocks and other supplies will be sold in addition to the books on these days, and lockers will be assigned to new students. Each student should come prepared to purchase two padlocks and to pay fees for gym towels.

Students are urged to secure books on these days if they expect to get them at the school. For the convenience of Deerfield students, a bus will leave Deerfield at 8:45 on Sept. 3 and 4, returning later in the morning at a time designated by the bus driver.

Nursery School Closed

The nursery school, which the high school has operated to give the girls a chance to study child care and development, will not be opened this year. Dr. Spears explained this action, taken at the last board meeting, as due to the lack of interest of the high school girls in this type of education.

The program will be renewed whenever the interest justifies the expenditure. Three men have been appointed in the field of physical education and coaching. They are: Chester Carlson, who received his college work at the University of Wisconsin and has been doing graduate work there also. Alexander Danakas is a graduate of Grinnell College, Iowa, and is doing graduate work at Northwestern university. Lester Kelly received his master's degree from Indiana university and his bachelor's degree
