One Out of Ten Highland Parkers Serving His Country

People are watching with interest the rapid growth of the Lion's Club Service Men and Women billboard. Few are the families in Highland Park that are not represented by at least one name.

Mr. Wilfred Seguin, Lion's Club member who has charge of recording new additions to the city's honor roll, states that at the present date there are 1340 names, with more to be added. That makes Highland Park's representation in the armed forces almost one out of every ten citizens contributing directly to the fighting effort.

From numerous phone calls received it indicates that not only the names of men who have recently joined the services of their country have not yet been added, but also that the list is not complete and up to date.

As names are reported to Mr. Seguin they are added to the Honor Roll.

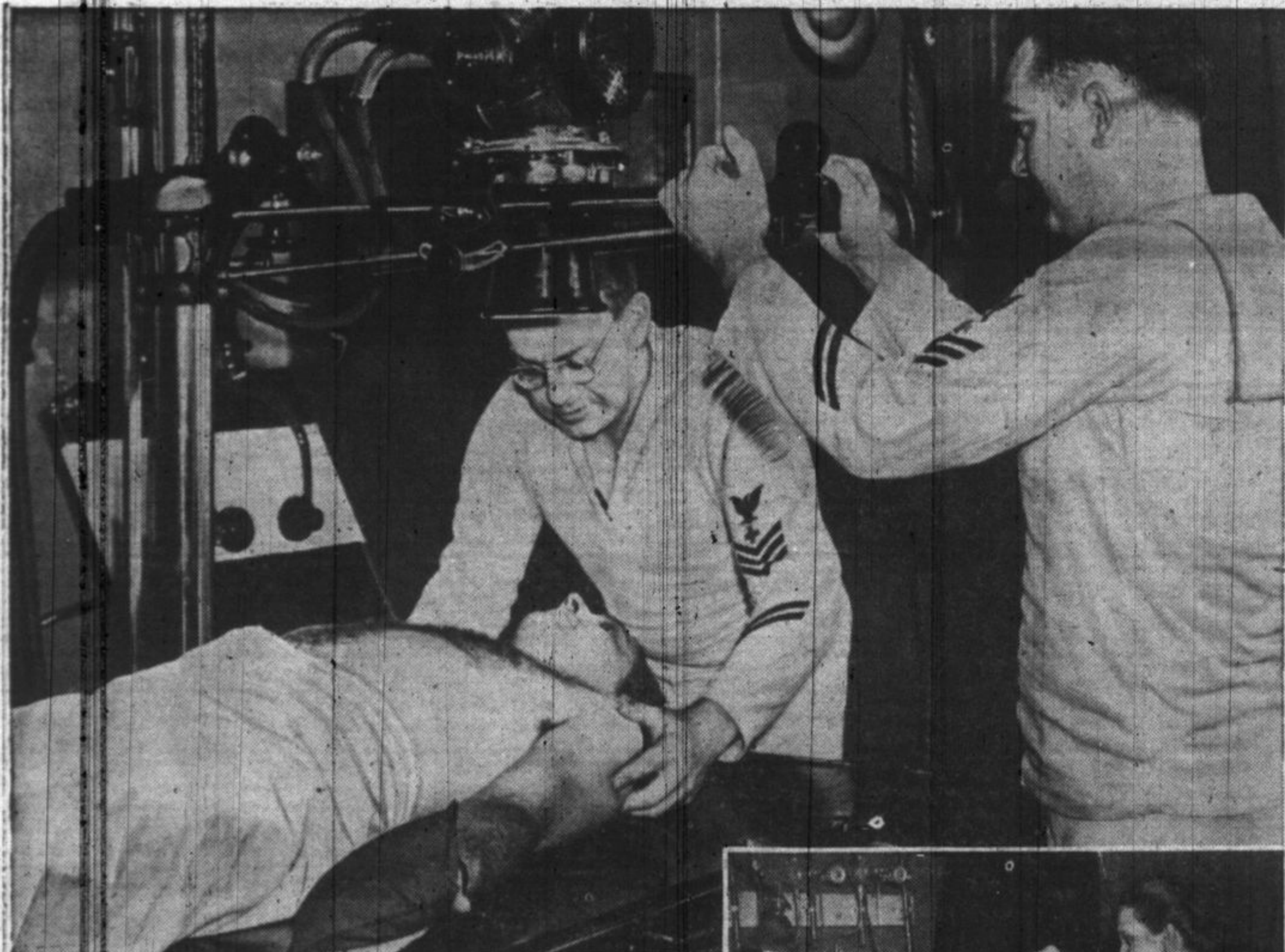

Field Hockey Season Opens

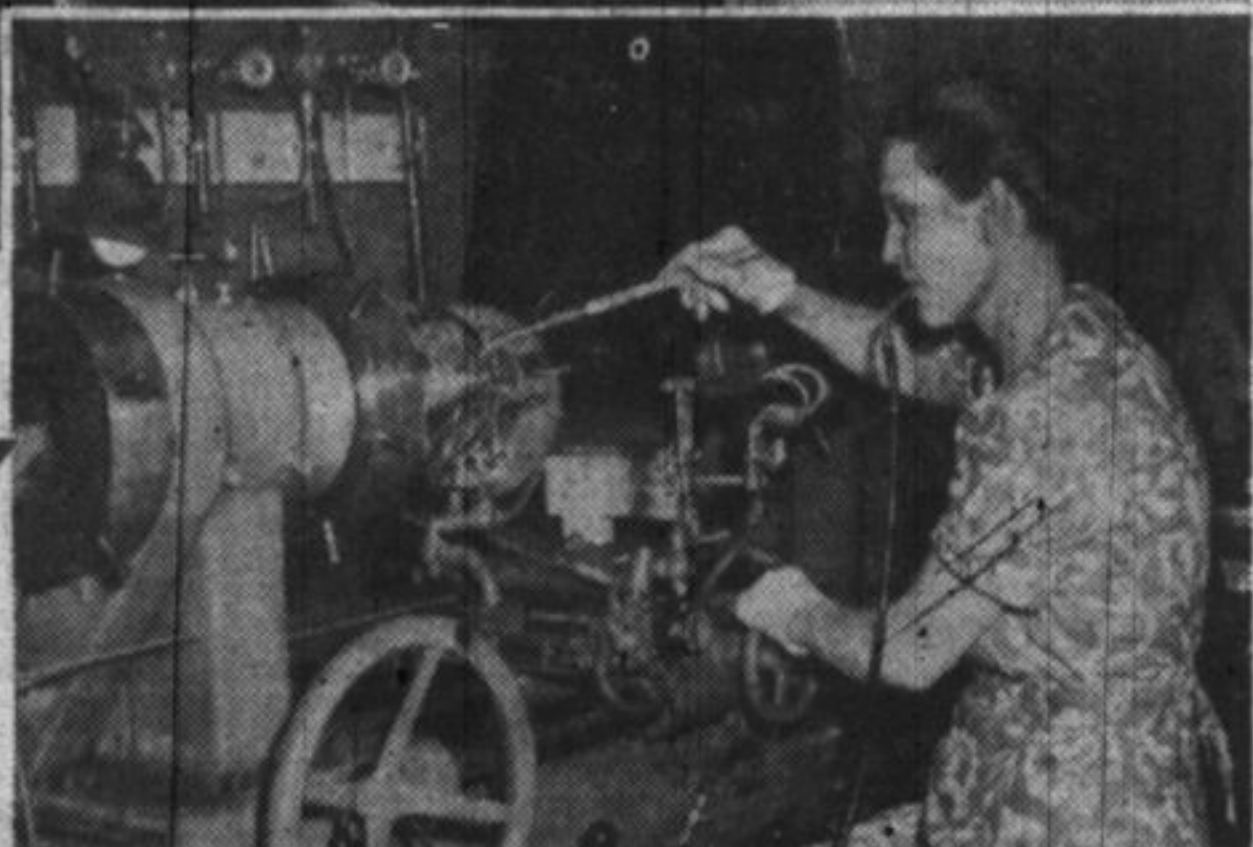

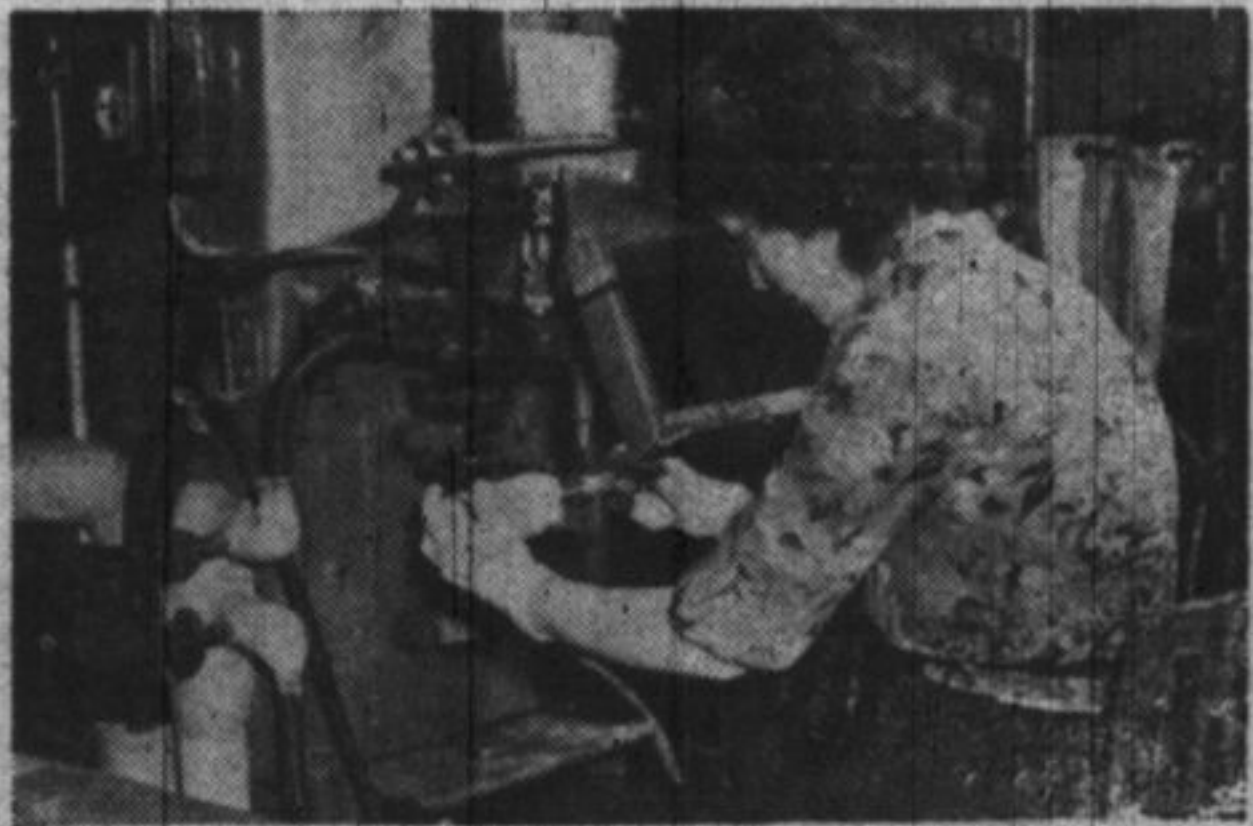

- 2 If you have a memo list of numbers called frequently, verify these numbers now by looking in your NEW directory.

- 5 Use the "Classified" section (yellow pages in most directories) to locate wanted products, services or professional help—especially important now that substitutes must be found.
