## Distinguished Flying Cross Awarded to Lieut. William Peters

The Distinguished Flying Cross has been awarded to Lieut. William E. Peters Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. William Peters of Exmoor Country club.

Lieut. Peters wrote his wife, the former Anne Miller, telling her the news and sending the citation. Lieut. Peters recently took part in another raid, his first since he was rescued from the North sea after being forced down in a battle with 25 German fighters. He wrote that he has been grounded since his last raid because of his ears, which were injured in his previous raid.

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Yes ma'am, we're in tiptop shape... ready for service on a moment's notice. How do we stay that way? Why, it's very simple. Our owner gives us the proper care. And you'd be surprised what the right treatment does for electric waffle bakers and sandwich toasters.

With your war workers on different shifts, you're probably using these appliances more to make one-person meals. So if you'd like to know how to keep your appliances in the pink of condition, we'll be glad to show you.

**After using your waffle maker**—After using your waffle maker, brush the edges and the grids with a wire brush. Use a wire brush to remove any fat from the grids. And leave the grids to cool.

**Never wash the grids; it will remove the "seasoning."** And if you take my advice, you'll keep water away from the heating coils and wiring.

**Stuck?** If the waffle should stick because of improper pre-heating or not enough shortening in the batter, brush off the grids with the wire brush and "re-season" them.

**"Seasoning"**—Cover the grids with a thin film of lard to fill the pores of the metal. Let the grids heat until they smoke. Then pour the batter. Discard the first waffle.

**Your grill**—Always preheat the grill with grids closed before using; for sandwiches, 6 to 7 minutes; for griddle cakes and meat, 7 to 9 minutes. When using waffle grids, preheat 11 minutes.

**When sandwiches are toasted in succession,** opening the grids will prevent overheating. But if some time elapses between one sandwich and the next, be sure to disconnect the grill occasionally.

**When finished,** wipe the grids of the sandwich grill with a damp cloth. If particles of grilled or fried food stick, remove them with a spatula or fine steel wool while the grids are still warm.

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
