## League of Women Voters to Study State Constitution

Following up the mandate given last spring by the twenty-second annual convention of the Illinois League of Women Voters to work for a new constitution for the state of Illinois, leaders from local leagues throughout the state will gather in Chicago today (Thursday) to open their campaign with a refresher course on the Constitution.

Mrs. Marc A. Law of Highland Park is presiding at the all-day meeting, held at the league headquarters at 225 N. Michigan avenue. Other members of the Highland Park league who are participating are Mrs. Raymond S. Simons, who is speaking on the Illinois judicial system, and Mrs. Philip Ringer, who is discussing education in Illinois.

In opening their campaign with this refresher course, the Illinois league follows its historic custom of learning all the facts about the subject before starting to act. The information gained by the leaders who attend the refresher course will be carried by them back to the thousands of local league members in the state for further study. Thus when the actual campaign opens for a new constitution league action will be backed by the informed opinion of the entire membership.

"Illinois has a horse and buggy constitution which handicaps every official of the state in doing the kind of a job that modern times demand," says Mrs. Florence Fifer Bohrer of Bloomington, president of the Illinois league. "Wherever we look, whether at state finances, education, social welfare, or at state administration generally, we can see how our constitution of 1870 keeps our state government from doing an efficient, economical and effective job."
