Bud Smith and his "Dynamic Piano Fingers" will be introduced to North Shore music lovers this week when the popular artist opens an engagement at the Highlander, beautiful new Show Lounge at 246 Railway Avenue in Highwood. Bud holds a top success rating in the middle-west as a specialty pianist. His superb playing is greeted with hosannas by entertainment seekers, and members of the critical fraternity are equally enthusiastic.

Public reaction to this great musician has been most spontaneous, particularly in Chicago and North Shore brighteries, and patrons of The Highlander are now assured of exciting evenings and a positive escape from worldly affairs for many weeks to come. This popular entertainer will live up to the reputation that has preceded him to the Highlander. The Adult Education program sponsored by the Highland Park high school will begin its eighth year on Monday evening, Oct. 11.

Classes will be held regularly each week on Monday and Wednesday evenings. Most courses offered will be scheduled for one evening a week unless the class registering shows a desire for more instruction.

**Tentative Program**  
The tentative program offered will include classes in beginning and advanced typing, beginning and advanced business English, beginning and advanced shorthand, bookkeeping, cooking, sewing, woodwork, mechanical drawing, household repairing, upholstery, public speaking, welding, and Americanization.

An effort is also being made to add beginning and advanced first aid, home nursing, and Spanish classes to the above list of offerings. Other classes will be offered if suggestions are received from large enough groups.

Registrations for all classes may be made on Monday and Wednesday evenings from 7:30 until 9 on October 4 and 6.

In spite of the large number of young people who are away from home in the service, the committee hopes for a large registration so that this program may continue to be as successful as in previous years.
