Ballet Russe Opens At Civic Opera House Oct. 15

A total of 18 productions, four of which are new this year, will be brought here by the Ballet Russe de Monte Carlo, which makes a nine day stop in Chicago's Civic Opera house beginning October 15. The Ballet Russe will visit Chicago for 13 performances in the course of its eleventh consecutive transcontinental tour.

Heading this company of 60 dancers is a triumvirate unparalleled in modern ballet history—Alexandria Danilova, prima ballerina of our day, Igor Youskevitch, exponent of classical dance, and Frederic Franklin, distinguished for prodigious variety and infinite popularity. Other stars of the company include Nathalie Krassovka, Ruthanna Boris, Dorothy Etheridge, Anna Istomina, Tatiana Grantzeva, Leon Danielian, and James Starbuck.

First Showing

The four new productions to receive their first Chicago showing during the coming engagement include the "Red Poppy," noted Soviet ballet which has been re-staged by the noted choreographer Igor Schwetoff. It is danced to a score of the same name by Reinhold Gliere, dean of Soviet composers, and has been dedicated by its creator to our gallant Soviet and Chinese allies.

Other new works are "Ancient Russia," a composite of Russian folk tales danced to the popular Tchaikovsky Piano Concerto; "Etude," which employs Bach music for its classical design and a new modern Spanish ballet called "The Cuckholds' Fair."

'The Student Prince' To Open Oct. 4 At Erlanger Theatre

The latest production of "The Student Prince," that popular lusty, robust and tender operetta, will play an engagement at the Erlanger Theatre, Chicago, beginning Monday, October 4, with matinees Wednesday and Saturday, and every night including Sunday. More resplendent than ever, in entirely new dress and scenic investiture, this musical favorite is coming to the Erlanger direct from a 17-week all summer engagement at the Broadway Theatre in New York.

Long hailed as one of the finest of all light operas, "The Student Prince" is certainly among the best balanced as to story, music, comedy and other elements which go to make up a tune show. Long before it was made into a musical production with Sigmund Romberg's thrilling melodies, it was a great play, known as "Old Heidelberg" in which Richard Mansfield starred for a number of years. It tells the story of the Prince who goes to college, falls in love with a little waitress of the student inn and then is suddenly called away to his throne—a sentimental tale which has both poignancy and tenderness. Few plays in modern theatrical history have attracted so much attention, and at one time the Messrs. Shubert had ten companies of the celebrated operetta running simultaneously in different parts of the country.

"The Student Prince" has one of the most resounding scores ever heard in a modern operetta, including such noted numbers as "Drinking Song," "Golden Days," "Deep in My Heart," "Serenade," "Farewell, Dear," "Just We Two" and "Student Life." This operetta boasts of a singing male chorus reputed to be one of the best collection of voices in the legitimate theatre.

Everett Marshall, former baritone of the New York Metropolitan Opera, is started at the head of the cast of featuring Frank Hornaday as the Prince, Laurel Hurley as Kathie, and many others.

All Waste Paper To Be Salvaged For Overseas Duty

Intense emergency need for paper at hand, with threats of a serious paper shortage impending unless a tremendous response in paper salvaging is made by all householders.

Not only newspapers, magazines, lined cartons tied together, and wrapping paper must be salvaged," reports Mrs. Nathan Corwith Jr., conservation chairman, "but even all the scraps from waste baskets are equally vital for the war effort, if each day they are put into paper bags, or wrapped in newspaper and tied."

Conditions, food, and medical supplies for the Army and Navy need a great amount of paperboard containers in their shipments east and west to all the fighting fronts.

Eight million tons is the estimated total of paperboard that must be produced this year. The only way that goal can be reached is by reprocessing ever increasing amounts of waste paper.

In Bundles
 Paper and flattened cartons, secretly tied in bundles, may be put in the salvage boxes at the Highland Park and Ravinia railroad stations. Or the Junior salvage captains will call for it and certify by phone. Bundles of 100 pounds will be picked up by the city trucks, phone H.P. 1400.

If newspapers are stacked, folded as on the news stands, and tied together in bundles 12 inches high, four bundles will weigh 100 pounds. Flattened cartons kept for city truck collection with the newspapers may be tied together in bundles 12 inches high or put in one large carton for the purpose. Smaller amounts of newspaper and cartons may be sold to the Suburban Waste Paper Co., addressed in the Highland Park News by calling H.P. 1256 or call Civilian Defense 1400. Ravinia parents may drop a note to school if they save 50 pounds, which will be called for and delivered to the school.

Parents are urged to remind their children each week to take old newspapers and magazines on the school collection day. Lincoln school's day is Tuesday morning; Ravinia school is Wednesday morning. The other schools will announce their collection day later in the school bulletins and newspapers.

Mrs. Corwith urges everyone to save every bit of paper, and to watch the news for further developments in collection plans.
