Lincoln School Develops Safety Patrol System

Almost every school in the land, where there is significant need for it, has a school boy safety patrol. Members of these patrols serve a definite purpose in helping to promote feasible principles of safety on the school grounds and its surrounding streets.

At the Lincoln school, District 108 in Highland Park, the boys and their director, Stanley McKee-principal of the school-have developed a system of patrolling that merits the attention of adults as well as children.

Underlyning the techniques employed by the boys and their director to achieve their objective is the fostering of a philosophy based upon the following principles: Cooperative effort and an effective school spirit. To increase the conception of the children as to the function of the patrol an assembly was held where the patrol boys explained the meanings of signs similar to those used by the railroad and the community for traffic crossings and to enforce safety regulations. The signs which were used were made in Mrs. Pierce's art classes. A movie and slides were also used to give exact meaning to what was said.
