Milstein Opens 20th Season of Recital Series

Nathan Milstein, famed violinist, will open the 20th year of the Winnetka Music club's Artist Recital series Monday evening, Oct. 18, at the New Trier high school auditorium at 8:30 o'clock.

This year the series is serving a twofold purpose: Providing fine music for the community, and making a substantial gift to the American Red Cross.

Milstein has made fourteen tours of the United States and Canada, many tours of Europe, three of South America, two in Mexico and has toured Egypt and Palestine. At the end of the current season, he will have appeared twenty-four times as soloist with the New York Philharmonic Symphony orchestra.

When his heavy schedule of concerts, recordings and broadcasts permits, Milstein relaxes at his 150-year-old Colonial farmhouse in Vermont. Here his time is divided between practice on his invaluable Stradivarius and indulgence in his major hobby: painting water colors.
