Register At Schools For

Ration Book 4; Oct. 21-23

Plans for issuing war ration book four follow the pattern used in issuing war ration books I and II. Registration for war ration book four will be held between Oct. 21 and 23, clusive. The registration will be held in the local elementary schools. Registrants will apply at the same school at which they received war ration books I and II.

A through K will register on Oct. 20, at 1:30 o'clock. Thursday, Oct. 21, and L through Z will register on Friday, Oct. 22. Saturday morning the schools will open to register all applicants who are unable to come on their scheduled

A person who fails to bring book III cannot be registered for book four. The application for war ration book four must be filed by an adult member of the family. In such instances where an adult member of a family or an individual cannot appear personally, the application may filed by an authorized agent, who presents was ration book III for the person for whom he is registering.

Highland Park's United Community Chest and National War Fund campaign ended its first week of campaigning with a stimulating report meeting of the general campaign committee Tuesday evening when with all districts reporting a total of 1,007 subscriptions for \$11,573, was turned in chalking up the all time record for a Community Chest report night.

Following the meeting, Chairman Earl E. Sproul of the general campaign committee announced that the grand total for the campaign had reached \$35,270, or 47 per cent of the total campaign goal of \$75,000, divided as follows:

From Districts: 1,365 Sub. \$14,928. From Spec. Gifts: 191 Sub. \$20,342.

Totals: 1,556 Sub. . \$35,270.
