Register At Schools For Ration Book 4; Oct. 21-23

Plans for issuing war ration book four follow the pattern used in issuing war ration books I and II. Registration for war ration book four will be held between Oct. 21 and 23, inclusive. The registration will be held in the local elementary schools. Registrants will apply at the same school at which they received war ration books I and II.

A through K will register on Thursday, Oct. 21, and L through Z will register on Friday, Oct. 22. Saturday morning the schools will be open to register all applicants who are unable to come on their scheduled days.

The hours will be as follows: Thursday, Oct. 21, from 9 a.m. until 8 p.m.; Friday, Oct. 22, from 9 a.m. until 8 p.m.; Saturday, Oct. 23, from 9 a.m. until 11:30 a.m.

A person who fails to bring book III cannot be registered for book four. The application for war ration book four must be filed by an adult member of the family. In such instances where an adult member of a family or an individual cannot appear personally, the application may be filed by an authorized agent, who presents war ration book III for the person for whom he is registering.

File a single application for all members of a group of persons who are related by blood, marriage, or adoption, and who regularly live in the same household. Include any family members temporarily away from home, such as students, travelers, or hospital patients, who are away not more than 60 days.

Persons living in the same household who are not related by blood, marriage, or adoption, must file separate applications.

Applications may not be made for: inmates of institutions of involuntary confinement, such as prisons and mental hospitals; members of armed forces of the United States or United Nations, who receive subsistence in kind (fed at general mess), or who are members of officers' messes; persons who intend to reside in the United States not more than 60 days.

The local elementary school teaching staff and volunteer workers, under the direction of the school administrators, will act as registrars. War ration book four will be used during the early part of November.

The harvest and thanksgiving festival known in Hebrew as Sucoth, meaning "Tabernacle" begins this year on the evening of Wednesday, Oct. 13, and continues for eight days. At North Shore Congregation Israel, Glencoe, the holiday will be celebrated on the first day, Thursday, Oct. 14, and on the eighth day, Thursday, Oct. 21. Rabbi James A. Wax will conduct an 11 o'clock service on each of these mornings and preach a brief sermon.

Sunday morning, Oct. 17, at 11 o'clock the annual joint Sucoth festival services for adults and children and consecration of new religious school pupils will be held. This will mark the first of the weekly services conducted at the temple by Rabbi Wax on Sunday mornings at 11 o'clock.

Correct Address for Overseas Mail Most Essential

The mail must include the name and address of the sender, the soldier's name, rank, army serial number, branch of service, organization, and A.P.O. number and be marked in care of the postmaster in the city through which the mail is routed.

Girls Interested In USO Work To Be Interviewed

Miss Leta Kirk, U.S.O. personnel associate in the National Office of the Army and Navy Y.M.C.A. will be at the U.S.O. club, 21 North Green Bay road in Highland Park, on Oct. 22, to confer with women interested in professional work in U.S.O. Miss Kirk is in charge of the selection of women for the position of association director in U.S.O. units operated throughout the United States by the Army and Navy Y.M.C.A.

Hundreds of women are at work professionally in this field of war service and increasing numbers are needed in the developing U.S.O. program. These women are aided in their work for the armed forces by many thousands of volunteer members of the Girls' Service organization and by an equal number of older volunteer women. In addition to the responsibility of recruiting and training such volunteers, professional workers are equipped to plan and carry out programs of wide scope in entertainment, hobby and educational activities for the leisure time of the service men.

Because of the wide-reaching responsibilities involved, assistant directors in U.S.O. units under Y.M.C.A. operation are selected largely from the 26-48 year age group of college trained women, and experience in group recreational work, in personnel work, or in the field of public relations is desirable. Miss Kirk will talk with persons interested in U.S.O. while she is in Highland Park. Appointments may be made through Arthur Rideour, the club director, or Erank Parcels, program director.
