Because of war conditions, there will be a tea following the meeting in lieu of the customary opening luncheon. Mrs. Wright's subject is "The United States in Search of a Policy."

Mrs. Wright, who has spoken to League members before, is director of the Chicago Council on Foreign Relations, succeeding Clifton M. Utley, who directed the affairs of the council for eleven years. She is trustee of the American Council of the Institute of Pacific Relations, president of the Woodrow Wilson foundation, and from 1934-42 was chairman of the Department of Government and Foreign Policy of the National League of Announced Women Voters.

She is also the author of several handbooks, including, "Toward Collective Peace System," "American 12 noon-Chancel service conducted Neutrality," and "What Every Citizen and numerous articles. She has both her Bachelor's and Master's degrees from the University of Minnesota, where she taught history for two


