## Mrs. Quincy Wright To Be Speaker At Voters League

The opening meeting of the 1943-1944 program of the Highland Park League of Women Voters will take place Wednesday, Oct. 20, at the Community center with Mrs. Quincy Wright as speaker. Because of war conditions, there will be a tea following the meeting in lieu of the customary opening luncheon. Mrs. Wright's subject is "The United States in Search of a Policy."

Mrs. Wright, who has spoken to League members before, is director of the Chicago Council on Foreign Relations, succeeding Clifton M. Utley, who directed the affairs of the council for eleven years. She is trustee of the American Council of the Institute of Pacific Relations, president of the Woodrow Wilson foundation, and from 1934-42 was chairman of the Department of Government and Foreign Policy of the National League of Women Voters.

She is also the author of several handbooks, including, "Toward a Collective Peace System," "American Neutrality," and "What Every Citizen Should Know About Foreign Policy," and numerous articles. She has both her Bachelor's and Master's degrees from the University of Minnesota, where she taught history for two years.

Mrs. Wright has made first-hand studies of international problems, including the League of Nations in Geneva and the mandate system in Palestine, Syria and Iraq. She visited China, attended five sessions of the Institute of Pacific Relations in Honolulu in 1926, in Kyoto in 1929, in Banff in 1931, in Yosemite in 1936, and in Virginia Beach in 1937. She was present at the seventh seminar for Cultural Relations with Mexico in 1932, has visited Russia and many sections of Europe. In 1938, Mrs. Wright was appointed an advisor to the United States delegation to the Lima conference, and she is now a consultant for the Office of the coordinator of Inter-American Affairs.

Mrs. James Standard Baker, vice president in charge of programs, will introduce the speaker. Mrs. Harold Wampler and Mrs. Mildred Haessler, social co-chairmen, are in charge of the tea. Members of the board will meet before the afternoon program.
