Dudley Crafts Watson Exhibits Paintings At Woman's Club

Highland Park Woman's club announces for the first art exhibit of the season, a group of twelve pictures painted by Dudley Crafts Watson during his recent sojourn in the village of San Jose de Pura, situated about one hundred and fifty miles west of Mexico City.

Mr. Watson tells of the beauty of that sky and land, where at any time of the year, travelers are attracted to the Spa, the springs there have both radium and sulphur waters, and are said to renew both life and youth, much in the manner of Ponce de Leon and his searchings.

Mr. and Mrs. Watson lived for nine weeks at the new hotel which has just been completed and was seven years in building.

The eruption of the volcano Paricutin which occurred last February, an account of which is given in the October Readers Digest, has greatly influenced the atmospheric conditions, heavy hazy clouds of iridescent dust hang continually in the air. In his paintings the artist has tried to capture the atmosphere of the ever-changing sky.

"Mexico is still the land of plenty, no rationing there, and though the nearest village Morelia was many miles away and the railroad more than one hundred miles distant, we thoroughly enjoyed our simple and free life," as Mr. Watson puts it, "our isolation was not disturbed by civilization."

The members are invited to view these pictures which are on display at the club for a limited time.
