Two Gas Workers Given Award For Saving A Life

At their regular monthly employees organization meeting held Friday evening in the North Shore Gas company's main office club room, A. W. Conover, president, made the presentation of the McCarter medal and certificate to William L. Magden, fitter, Waukegan shop. Harold W. Dunn, safety director, presented the McCarter certificate of assistance to Walter H. Dietmeyer, Waukegan shop fore-

The medal and certificates were awarded by the executive board of the American Gas association on Sept. 14 for the saving of a human life by application of the prone pressure method of resuscitation.

Being ready to save a life by the use of artificial respiration is part of the training North Shore Gas company employees receive. It is applied to restore natural breathing to persons who have ceased breathing after submersion, electric shock and exposure to carbon monoxide and other aceidents causing asphyxiation or suffocation. Both of these employees applied this method a few months ago to a victim of gas asphyxiation and by their efforts a human life was saved. These men were among many of the

Gas company employees who participated in the American Red Cross standard first aid course held in the company's club room. Artificial respiration is one of the subjects stressed in that course.

Recognition of their good work has now been made by the American Gas association by making these awards. About 25 local employees of the Highland Park branch of the North
