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The new deadline has been set for the benefit of persons who receive official change of address notification subsequent to Sept. 30. The reason for the separate provision is that relatives and friends of soldiers being shipped now would have expected the soldiers still to be in this country at Christmas time and would not have sent parcels in time for the regular Oct, 15 deadline for overseas mailing.

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Merle Burke To Be Speaker At Ravinia Club

Discussion of our Far-Eastern Ravinia Woman's club evening meeting Wednesday, Nov. 10, at 8 o'clock in the Village house. The speaker is Merle Burke, historian, traveler and collaborator with Upton Close on a new history book soon to be published by The MacMillan company.

Mr. Burke will tell the story of China and Japan, from the time the so-called "white, man of the West" first became interested in the East, beginning with Vasco da Gama discovering the first all-water route from western Europe to the East, and covering the historical developments of the Far East on down to Pearl Harbor. He portrays how the United States was drawn into events in the Pacific area and closes with a realistic evaluation of present U.S. policy toward the Far East, both with regard to the war and post-war possibilities.
