Dinner-Dance of Cradle Auxiliary Discussed At Meeting

The regular meeting of the Highland Park auxiliary of the Cradle was far from "regular" last Monday since the organization's big event of the year, the annual dinner-dance on Thanksgiving eve at the Villa Moderne, is only two weeks away. To make things even more interesting, Mrs. Frank Hough, the party chairman this year, at whose home the meeting was held, had a brand new three months old Cradle baby to exhibit. The Houghs have one other Cradle child, Mary, who is now five years old. Mary's new little sister was presented to her last week for the first time.

All proceeds of the dinner-dance go to the Cradle in Evanston.

Some of the highlights of the party include the 200 pound live pig which was donated by Ellsworth Mills for a door prize, a \$100 war bond, golf clubs and balls, leather brief case, nylon stockings, Champagne, Bourbon, Scotch, Wine, and dozens of other prizes.

About forty young women in Highland Park comprise the auxiliary which works the year 'round raising money for the Cradle through dues, cradle banks distributed along the North Shore, and the major project, the dinner-dance. They sew layettes, averaging about 40 finished garments per month.

The Cradle in Evanston is a nursery equipped to give infants who for some reason are deprived of the care of their natural parents, as nearly perfect care as science has learned to give to the newly born.
