#### No More Copies of Ration Books 1-2 Will Be Issued

No more copies of war ration books one or two are to be issued by the board for any purpose whatsoever, Walter Meierhoff, chairman of the Highland Park War Price and Ration board announced today.

All stamps in the two books have now expired except stamp 18 in war ration book one, used in buying shoes, and blue stamps X, Y and Z in book two; which are valid for buying rationed processed foods. These stamps should be safeguarded against loss because local boards are no longer authorized to replace them if lost, stolen or destroyed. The shoe stamp will be valid until further notice. If it ever becomes necessary to set an expiration, date 30 days notice will be given to holders for their guidance.
