Miss Ellis Richardson, daughter of Chief Petty Officer and Mrs. Wilson Richardson, 644 Michigan avenue, who suffered a relapse of a rare nerve disease a week ago Thursday, is recuperating in her home. Although she will not return to work as a switchboard operator at the local office of Illinois Bell Telephone company, her condition this week is very much improved and she plans only to take a long rest cure.

Miss Richardson was first stricken with the disease about six weeks ago. At that time she lost her sight and speech, and her arms and legs were partially paralyzed. When she collapsed a second time, she suffered no paralysis, but again temporarily lost her sight and speech and was unconscious several days.
