## Two-Piano Team To Appear At New Trier School

The two-piano team Vronsky and Babin appearing on Dec. 13 at the New Trier high school has been called "the most brilliant two piano team of our generation" by Nelson Lansdale of the national publication, "Newsweek".

Since first coming to the United States, the two-piano team Vronsky and Babin have played in hundreds of cities and towns, their concert tours taking them from the Atlantic to the Pacific Coast.

They have played for all types of audiences, those of the big cities, university audiences, small-town audiences, the mammoth multitudes at the Hollywood Bowl.

All of which was a revelation to these young Russians (who, by the way, have taken out their first citizenship papers and are on their way to becoming American citizens). They confess that like a number of Europeans who knew nothing about it, they had entertained the idea that music was a sort of step-child laid on the doorstep of America—fostered, but never deeply loved, and more of a pastime for the leisured rich.

They know now that they were wrong—they were amazed to discover a musical America—little towns of not more than five or six hundred inhabitants with fine up-to-date auditoriums, where concerts given by many of the foremost artists of the days.

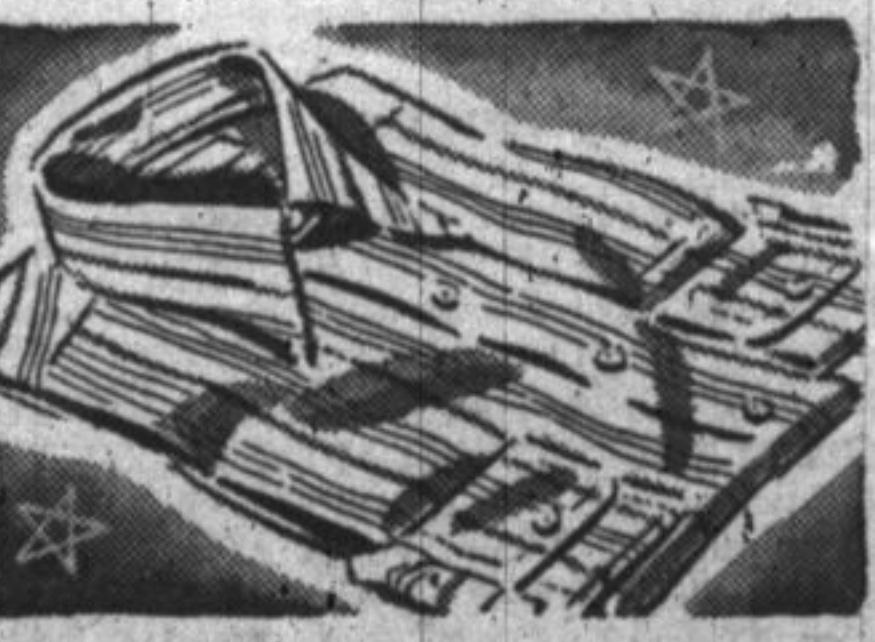
