Acquaint Members Of Voters League With UNRRA Facts

To acquaint members of the Highland Park League of Women Voters with the facts about the UNRRA (United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation administration) so that they may communicate with senators and representatives when it comes before Congress to approve our final partibers of the league on Dec. 15.

The UNRRA grew out of an invitation which President Roosevelt sent last year to thirty-three United Nations and eleven Allied Nations to participate in a planning conference. All the nations accepted, and a final agreement was reached this fall. It proposes to coordinate and administer relief measures: it assumes the power to acquire properties, enter into obligations, create agencies, and manage relief work. Whenever possible, it suggests that each member government carry out its own relies and use its own resources in accord

that each nation contribute one per cent of its national income. The agreement provides that the expenses shall be allocated to the member governments in proportions deter mined by the council.
