Total of \$72,191.76 In Subscriptions to Community War Fund

Announcing the official closing of the Highland Park Community and War Fund campaign last night, Earl E. Sproul, chairman of the general campaign committee and J. M. Maxwell, chairman of the special gifts committee reported a total of \$72,191.76 in subscriptions received from 3,306 Highland Park subscribers.

While the total secured in Highland Park falls \$2,808 short of the \$75,000 goal which had been set, the amount subscribed and the total number of subscribers marks an all time record for a financial campaign of this character in Highland Park and the campaign committee, in announcing the final closing of solicitation, stated that they were still hopeful that the shortage would be made up when full transfer of subscriptions made by Highland Park citizens to the Chicago Community and War Fund campaign was made. "It will take some time for this transfer to be worked out," Mr. Sproul said.

"Both the special gifts committee and the general campaign committee have done as complete a job as possible in this campaign," President Kehbon of the Highland Park Community Chest said last night. "These committees covered practically 100 percent of the prospects in the Community and the Community Chest officials are proud of the record made and are sincerely appreciative of the great amount of time and effort given by all the volunteer workers."

War Office Promises Quick And Accurate News From Front

Next-of-kin of service men who have been taken prisoner by the enemy will receive swift and accurate notification, the Office of War Information has announced. The government immediately will transmit free any accurate information from a reliable source dealing with prisoners of war. OWI warned against reliability of enemy broadcasts and against paying any private individual or organization for such information.

Ration Stamp 1, Stamp 18 Ration Bk. 1, To Be Used for Shoes

Because some people have used the wrong stamps in Book Three for shoes, OPA has issued the following statement: "War Ration Book Three has four pages of black-picture-stamps showing guns, tanks, ships, and airplanes. The page of airplane stamps is next to the brown food stamps in the pack of book three." The shoe stamp shows a miniature airplane in flight and is labeled "Ration Stamp 1." This stamp came into use on November 1, and it will remain valid indefinitely, along with stamp 18 in Ration Book One.

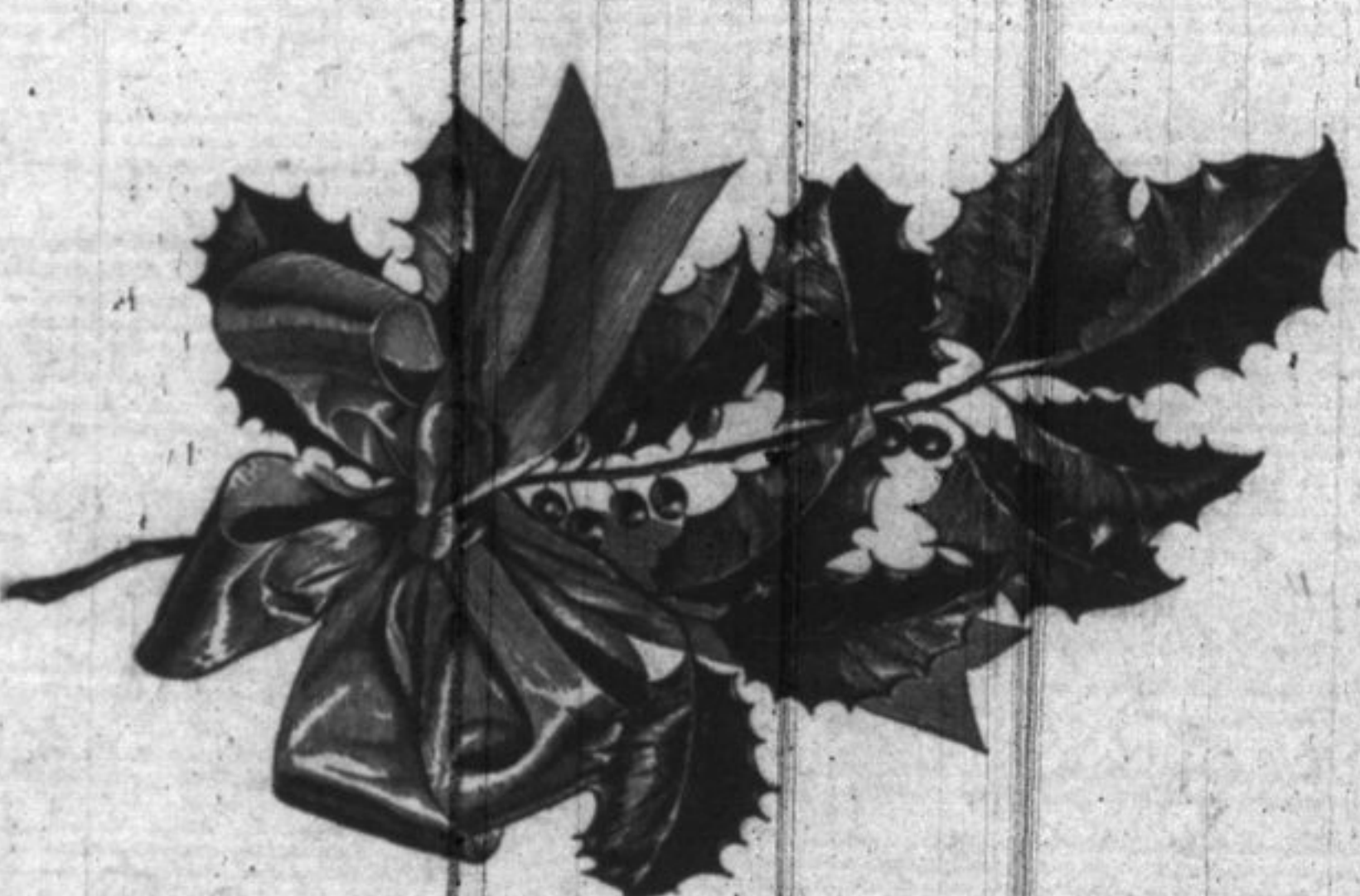
