WACs May Be Trained for Hospital Work

Because of growing demands for more WAC technicians to work in army hospitals, the Women's Army corps in cooperation with other units of the army has established an enlisted technicians' school, where qualified members of the corps receive training in army hospital procedures, Mrs. Harry Pertz, chairman of WAC in Highland Park, has announced.

Until recently, the Women's Army corps assigned to technical duties in army hospitals only those members who had been trained for the same kind of work in civilian life, Mrs. Pertz declared. Since more technical aides are needed, however, the WAC has taken steps to provide training for its own. An eight-weeks' course is given at the enlisted technicians' school for medical and surgical technicians, and a course of 12 weeks for dental, laboratory or X-ray technicians.

Applicants for the enlisted technicians' school are chosen from the ranks of the Women's Army corps, on the basis of educational background, previous experience and aptitudes as disclosed by army classifications test.

A small group of Service Mothers gave Christmas morning breakfast, on Saturday, to the servicemen who slept at the Highland Park USO on Christmas Eve. One competent yeoman, 13/c, who modestly prefers to remain anonymous, whipped up a fine batch of pancakes, to which his companions did ample justice. Special guests were Rev. and Mrs. H. K. Platzer.

Following the breakfast each serviceman gave a brief account of his background prior to induction, and Rev. Platzer spoke briefly but interestingly on Religion and the Post War World. A gift from the Service Mothers' Club was presented to each guest.

R.A.F Pilot Officer Submits Best Slogan In YMCA Contest

David J. Eales, pilot officer in the RAF, now stationed in Canada, is the winner of a nation-wide contest to select the best slogan for the 100th anniversary of the Y.M.C.A. in 1944, Highland Park U.S.O. director of the army and navy Y.M.C.A., announced today.

"Serving youth that youth may better serve," was the winning slogan. It was submitted by the RAF officer while spending a furlough at the Y.M.C.A. in Miami, Florida. His prize is a \$100 war bond.

"As an enlisted airman I had many occasions to appreciate the work of the 'Y', and almost as soon as I saw the slogan competition poster I thought of the slogan as exactly describing the work that I'd seen the 'Y' do," Pilot Officer Eales wrote.

Pilot Officer Eales' slogan was chosen from among thousands of entries received from all parts of the country by a committee consisting of Merle Crowell, director of public relations of Rockefeller Center; Francis S. Harmon, executive vice-chairman of the War Activities committee of the Motion Picture Industry; Prof. Harrison S. Elliott, head of the department of religious education of Union Theological seminary; Stanley High, roving editor of Reddy's Digest, and Francis Pratt, circulation manager of the Life, Time and Fortune magazines.
