TAKE CARE OF YOUR ELECTRIC APPLIANCES... THEY'RE SCARCE IN WARTIME

I get better service from my electric washer by following these suggestions



- 1. Follow manufacturer's instructions on how much clothing your washer should hold. 2. Rinse wringer rolls and wipe dry. When not in use, always release pressure on wringer rolls, so they will not become flat on one side. 3. Put enough hot water in to fill it to the waterline after clothes are in. 4. Be careful not to chip or crack porcelain. Chipped spots may rust and stain clothing. 5. Fill the tub with fresh, clean water after washing. Remove and rinse agitator or suction cups. 6. Never allow dry suds to remain in washer. 7. Have a serviceman inspect your washer occasionally. 8. Connecting cord should be wiped dry after disconnecting and put loosely in tub. 9. If motor fails to start, disconnect current promptly, or you may damage your washer.
