Plans To Establish Red Cross Center At 521 Central Avenue

Committee chairmen of the Highland Park chapten of the American Red Cross met Thursday at local Red Cross headquarters for a general discussion period and to hear plans for the establishment of a Highland Park Red Cross center. Edward A. Menke, general chairman of the Highland Park Red Cross committee, presided.

Chairman Menke announced to the workers that the center would be located in the Public Service store building at 521 Central avenue, and would be opened within the next 10 Mrs. Edward Smith has been senior staff assistant of the center, which will be manned by a group of staff assistants and other volunteers. Dr. Louis Sherwin Named Chairman of **Red Cross Drive**

Dr. Louis W. Sherwin, minister of Highland Park Presbyterian church, has been named chairman of the American Red Cross War Fund drive to take place in Highland Park next month, according to an announcement made yesterday by E. A. Menke, gen-

eral Red Cross chairman for the city Under Dr. Sherwin's supervision, plans for the drive are now well under way and an effective working organization is being set up.

In view of the increased activities of the Red Cross, last year's national goal of 125 million dollars has been raised this year to 200 million dollars. The goal for the Chicago, district has been set at 12 million dollars.

"Highland Park always has responded generously to the needs of the Red Cross, and while the quota for our city has not yet been established, it will be somewhat higher than the \$32,500 we raised last year," Dr. Sherwin said yesterday. "However, I am sure that every Highland General chairman-E. A. Menke, Park home will want to assume their full share of responsibility in seeing that our quota is met."


