Dr. Louis W. Sherwin, minister of Highland Park Presbyterian church, has been named chairman of the American Red Cross War Fund drive to take place in Highland Park next month, according to an announcement made yesterday by E. A. Menke, general Red Cross chairman for the city.

Chairman Menke announced to the workers that the center would be located in the Public Service store building at 521 Central avenue, and would be opened within the next 10 days. Mrs. Edward Smith has been named senior staff assistant of the center, which will be manned by a group of staff assistants and other volunteers. Further details concerning the center will be announced in a later issue of the News.

Principal speakers at the meeting were Miss Margot Atkin, American Red Cross director of Community Service, and Mrs. Ekeator Feeney, suburban supervisor of Home Services. They outlined in detail what was expected of the volunteers for staff assistant duties.

Tin Cans Needed for Weapons; Containers

Tin cans are needed more than ever for conversion into tin-used in many weapons of war as well as in the millions of cans for shipping most of the 30,000 tons of food eaten daily by our armed forces.

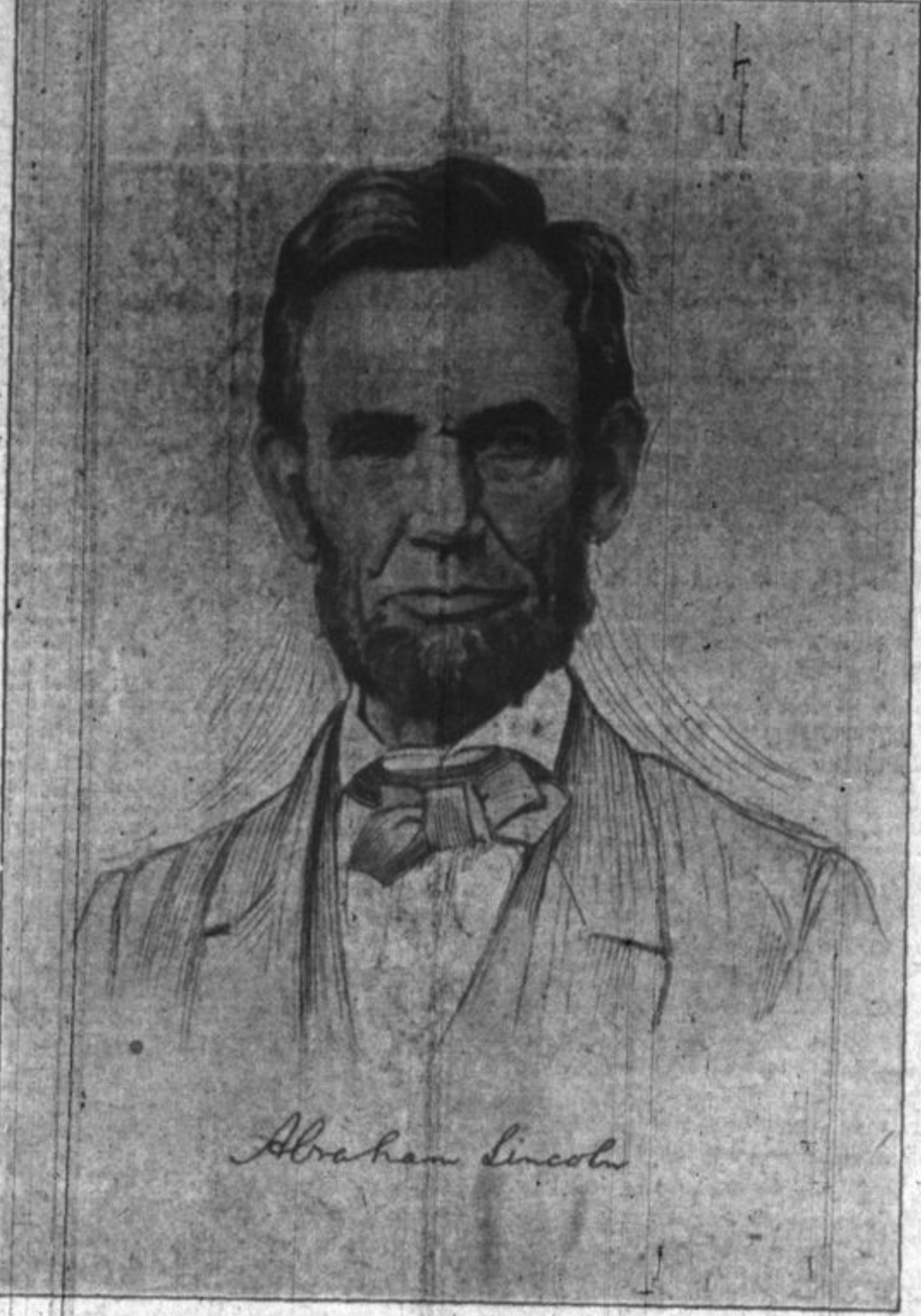
"Highland Parkers must save more cans from now on," said Mrs. Carlton C. Cummins, tin can chairman. "Our tin can shipment to the detinning plants has had to be changed from every month to once in three months, owing to the fact that Fort Sheridan's cans, which were formerly shipped with Highland Park's, are now shipped separately."

"If more housewives will remember to save every can, we hope to resume the monthly shipments. The four easy rules for supplying our army and navy with the tin they need so desperately are: 1. Wash empty can, remove paper labels. 2. Open cans, bottoms as well as tops, tuck in tops and bottoms. 3. Flatten cans by stepping on them. Leave enough space between flattened sides to see through them. 4. Keep your flattened cans in a container, separate from trash, until your garbage collector calls for Housewives with no regular collector should arrange with a neighbor to put cans with hers. Or junior captains will call for cans if notified by phone. Phone the Civilian Defense office, Highland Park 1400 if you do not have your captain's name."

Mrs. Philip Ranger, salvage chairman of division 8, reports as completely false a rumor that tin cans were being left in a hole west of the city. "Any cans seen in such a place," states Mrs. Ringer, "Have been placed there by irresponsible persons not aware of the urgent need for tin. Every can collected by garbage trucks or junior captains is shipped to a detinning plant for use in war production."

96% Eel Place Pupils Purchase War Stamps; Earn Minute Man Flag

last minute check-up of 4th War Loan subscriptions by A. E. Patton, director, and N.S. Sharp, co-director, yesterday (Wednesday) brought both encouragement and concern.

While it's almost certain that Highland Park will make its \$790,000 4th War Loan quota by February 15, when the national drive ends, Director Patton stated, "we still have more than a fourth of the way to go to meet our E bond quota."

The Treasury department is especially anxious to increase the number of individual purchasers of war bonds. From this standpoint it is not enough that we make our dollar quota.

"We want to demonstrate again, as we did during the 3rd War Loan, that the rank and file of Highland Park people are determined in their support of the war."

Block Chairmen
The local War Loan committee is especially gratified by the performance of our block chairman organization. This body of men and women is demonstrating an increasing skill and knowledge of the important work which they have enlisted, and they have expressed the hope that a foundation has been built on which permanent war loan finance organization can be erected. Other cities have already made plans in this direction and it is felt Highland Park should be not far behind.

A typical picture of what is happening out in the field, according to Director Sharp, came to light through a report of one of the division chairmen.

Seventy-two families out of possibly 200 in that division have subscribed \$32,292.50 in E bonds, or an average of \$448.50. Co-Director Sharp stated, "These sales were made by only 4 out of the 12 block chairmen. We believe the others will do in equally good reports."

From our experience to date in this campaign we now know that if people are called on by the block chairman, a satisfactory volume of sales is secured. Where a poor report is turned in it is almost certainly that people have not been called upon.

Letter of Foot Work
As one chairman stated, raising the quota is simply a matter of foot work. Another division chairman reported an average of 3 E bond sales each house.

Increased activity is marking the close of the local war loan campaign, with 50 per cent of the block chairmen still to be heard from, the management of the drive is predicting an improvement in E bond sales by the close of the national campaign, February 15.
