Woman Explorer to Be Speaker At No. Shore Sunday Evening Club

Mrs. Carl Akeley, wife of the African explorer and scientist, the late Carl Akeley, will be the speaker at the North Shore Sunday Evening club next Sunday, Feb. 13, at New Trier high school. Her lecture will be illustrated with motion pictures and colored slides. The subject will be "The Bright Side of The Once Dark Continent." She will tell of her expeditions with her husband and what she has done "on her own." In Africa, Mr. and Mrs. Akeley stalked with their cameras, long-necked giraffes. Then on foot they completed the long trek to the 12,000 foot volcano of the Belgian Congo, where both gorillas and pygmies lived. Then came the explorer's death from fever. His wife remained in their jungle camp and there, a mid storm and sleet, she carried on completing the collection he had planned for his gorilla group for the Akeley African hall at the American Museum of Natural History. After finishing his work, she led the expedition down the mountain sides across 100 miles of super-heated jungle to where the expedition's motor trucks had long awaited their return. This was followed by other expeditions. She received many honors for what she had done. Albert, King of the Belgians, decorated her.

Infant Welfare Funds Yield High Dividends In Children's Health

Infant welfare members in Highland Park and Ravinia will be among those attending the Thrift shop's annual "white elephant" tea Monday afternoon in the home of Mrs. Herman Ziskel, 100 Hazel avenue. That Infant Welfare funds, including its share in Thrift Shop proceeds, are yielding high dividends in terms of healthy children, was brought into sharp focus by the annual report of Dr. Heyworth N. Sanford, medical director of the Infant Welfare society of Chicago. With 6,702 infants cared for during 1943, Dr. Sanford reported a total of only 27 deaths. This figure, though higher than last year's all-time low of 15, nevertheless represents a tremendous achievement in view of wartime conditions, Dr. Sanford believes. In contrast, he reported that in 1918, under comparable wartime circumstances, 174 infant patients of the society died. Wartime shortages of doctors, less diligent care of babies in homes where mothers are working, are some of the reasons for the increase in infant mortality over last year, the report stated.
