**Fred R. McVeity, Dies After Illness**

subscriptions by at least 50 per cent or give double because the need is double." Co-chairman Hardacre commented yesterday.

"Some persons are giving from five to 10 times as much this year as they did last year," the Rev. Mr. Sherwin stated. "Yet they can't measure their increased gifts against the fighting that our soldiers are doing everywhere all over the globe."

Directing the house-to-house campaign in five sectors of the city are: Eugene J. O' Riley, Mrs. C. Longford Felske, H. G. Yost, H. Bowen Stair, J. P. McHugh and Harry Earhart.

## Districts Divided

The five sectors are divided into 16 geographical districts. The first to top their quotas were districts six, with 106 per cent; No. 10, with 110 per cent, and No. 16, with 101 per cent.

Among the first of such contributions received was \$100 from the Service Mother's club. Fifty dollars will go to the war prisoners fund of the Red Cross.

**Schools Hold Drive**

The school children, through the Junior Red Cross, are conducting their own drive in all of the city's grade schools and in the high school. While the final results from all schools are not known, Supt. L. B. Ball of district 108, reports that already a partial collection of \$400 has been made from the children of his district. This will shortly be combined with other Junior Red Cross gifts and turned over to the War fund committee.

of the proposed amendments would be as follows: (1) some state laws, such as labor laws for women industrial workers, would probably be thrown out at once. This is one of the chief objectives of the proponents of the amendments. (2) all laws treating men and women differently would be in question until, through endless litigation, the Supreme Court had finally arrived at interpretation of what "equal rights" or "equality of rights under the law" means. (3) it would not substitute new legislation for the laws that are now in force; the state legislatures would have to do this, just as they are free to do now, and are doing. Even after the states change their laws, each new one would be subject to challenge in the courts until meaning had been given to the amendment through court decisions. (4) The proposed amendments would be an attempt to solve the complexities of the problem by formula, and like most such apparently simple solutions, it would just open up more difficult aspects.
