Red Cross War Fund

The Red Cross War Fund drive in Highland Park has now reached a totol of \$43,749.96, the Rev. L. W. Sherwin and Gilbert K. Hardacre, co-chairmen of the drive, reported yesterday. This exceeds the amount collected in Highland Park last year for the same purpose by \$11,461, and exceeds the 1944 quota of \$40,000 assigned to Highland Park by 9 per cent.

There are still a number of persons in Highland Park who have yet contributed, but who should make gifts for the purpose of helping to maintain the vital and increasingly important Red Cross activities for our fighting soldiers and sailors in every corner of the world. Some Highland Parkers are already supplementing their original gifts by giving to the War Fund again.

All gifts, no matter how small or large, should be turned into Highland Park Red Cross headquarters located in the Public Service company building, 521 Central ayenue. It is urged that all such donations, or pledges for gifts payable later in the year, be turned in within the next few days.

Secretary Morgenthau has announced the appointment of Renslow P. Sherer, of Highland Park, as chairman of the Illinois War Finance committee to succeed Harold H. Swift. The appointment is effective immediately.

Mr. Swift has been committee chairman since shortly after Pearl Harbor, and is now retiring to devote his time to other war activities and to his business. Mr. Sherer has been executive manager of the committee for the past ten months. Both have served as dollar-a-year men.

The business background of Mr. Sherer includes some 10 years in investment banking with the Harris Trust and Savings bank of Chicago and as vice president of the Northwestern Trust company, St. Paul, Minnesota; several years in advertising and now he is chairman of the board of the Sherer-Gillett company of Marshall, Michigan, manufacturers of commercial refrigeration.
