

1/4 cup minced parsley Cook celery, covered, in 1/4 cup boiling water, for 10 min. Meanwhile, cook macaroni in 1 qt. (4 cups) boiling water until tender. Drain, and arrange in a 1-qt. casserole. Next stir the fat, mustard, salt, pepper, flour, and Worcestershire into the undrained celery. Mix well. Add milk, and heat to boiling,

Scrub potatoes. Cover with boiling salted water. Cover; boil 20-25 minutes, or until tender. Drain; peel. Press through ricer. Add fat or salad oil; season with salt and pepper.
