## Pi Delta Club Discusses Women's Place in Politics

At the monthly meeting of the Pi Delta Club held at the YWCA on May 12, six members discussed the importance of women in the country today, economically, politically and socially. Stressing the coming election, Miss Laura Cross mentioned that in twelve states there is now a majority of women voters, and urged members to study the problems coming up for vote.

Women, she continued, should realize and think about the powerful issues to be decided upon—plans for the peace and all the post-war developments, social security, foreign policy, NURRA, ILO, and the efforts being made by churches and YWCAs.

Mrs. R. J. Loewenthal, of the League of Women Voters, who attended the meeting, urged members to work toward developing a World Council, and suggested the reading of Walter Lippmann's U. S. Foreign Policy. During the question and answer period, the members decided that they, as well as all women, have much solid reading and serious thinking to do about making a lasting peace for the world.

## Elderly Resident Succumbs to Illness

Carl L. Enchelmayr, 73, of 488 Highland place, died Friday in Hennrich hospital, Chicago, after an illness which forced his retirement from business two years ago.

Mr. Enchelmayr was born in Germany and came to Chicago in 1893. For nearly half a century, he was purchasing agent for the Bismarck hotel in Chicago.

He leaves his widow, Marie, two daughters, Mrs. Marie Herbst and Mrs. Dorothy Romer of Highland Park, two sons, Ernest J. of Glenview and Carl W. of Evanston, and eight grandchildren.

## More Than 3000 GI's Trained in Three R's In Ft. Sheridan Unit

More than 3,000 GI's unable to read and write well enough to meet Army standards today serve their country efficiently because of the 1672nd Special Training at Ft. Sheridan, which, commanded by Capt. John D'Allessandro, and numbering 1,200, has a record of graduating more than 90 per cent of its students.

Students unable to pass 4th grade requirements are divided into four companies and given a systematic educational course plus instruction in basic military subjects.

Three hours daily, for a maximum of 12 weeks, they are under the direction of one of 105 instructors, half of whom were teachers in civilian life. They are taught to read simple sentences in the Army reader, "Private Pete," taught to write, count and do simple division and multiplication from an Army arithmetic book. Those unfamiliar with English are transferred to classes where specially trained instructors work with them for six hours daily.

On Monday morning, May 22, 1944, through the courtesy of Mr. F. E. Purcell, Director of the Highland Park USO, the Office of Price Administration rental office at Waukegan will have Atty. Frank L. Kearney in Highland Park at the USO headquarters, 21 No. Green Bay Road, for the purpose of registering all dwelling units which have been rented on and since Mar. 1, 1942—the date that rents were frozen.

The regulations on rent control require that all property rented for dwelling purposes must be registered. This applies to one room in a private home as well as hotels, rooming houses, apartments and homes.

Mr. Kearney will be at the USO headquarters from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., and it is suggested that all landlords in the immediate vicinity of Highland Park avail themselves of this opportunity to register near home now, rather than go to Chicago or Waukegan at some later date.
