## Highland Park Recreation Board In Operation June 1

### Each Scrap of Paper Vital to War Effort

The regular monthly waste paper pick-up from every curb in Highland Park, will start Monday, June 5. The same route as in May will be followed through Friday, June 9. The day for each district is listed below.

Every scrap of paper is a vital contribution to the war effort. Salvage must be increased by more than 20 per cent to meet the 1944 quota for packaging food, medical supplies, and ammunition.

To avoid that last minute rush, householders should start now to prepare their paper for collection, suggests Mrs. Nathan Corwith Jr., Salvage chairman. It must be put on the curb the night before the pick-up day, as the trucks make an early start.

**To Prepare Waste Paper**  
 Newspapers—fold in half, the way the paper boy sells them, and tie in bundles 12 inches high.  
 Magazines—tie in bundles 18 inches high, or weigh down with rocks.  
 Corrugated and cardboard boxes and cartons, including all types of cereal and dry grocery containers—flatten them out and tie in bundles 12 inches high.  
 Wastebasket paper—empty match packs included—pack down in a box or bag. Keep a carton for this near desk or some other convenient spot on each floor of the house. Paper may be either wet or dry.  
 Rags of all kinds, needed for emergency construction and factory use, may be put on the curb with the paper.

The schedule for curb pick-up is:

**Pick-up Route**  
 Monday, June 5—Central avenue and north to city limits, east of tracks.  
 Tuesday, June 6—Central avenue to Beech street, east of tracks.  
 Wednesday, June 7—Beech street to County Line road, east of tracks.  
 Thursday, June 8—Central avenue to County Line road, west of tracks.  
 Friday, June 9—Central avenue north to city limits, west of tracks.

## Swimming Classes At High School To Begin On June 12

The swimming classes at the Highland Park high school will begin on June 12, and will meet twice a week for eight weeks.

There will be three different classes. The first class will be for beginners, youngsters who do not know how to swim or those who can swim only a few strokes. The intermediate class will be for those who are able to swim fairly well but who have had little instruction in the crawl, breast, back, and side strokes. Their class time will be devoted to instruction in these strokes and also diving. The advanced class will be for those individuals who are strong swimmers. Class time for them will be spent on improving swimming form, developing speed and endurance, and learning life saving techniques.

The pool will be available on Wednesdays for recreational swimming. No instruction will be given in these classes.

The classes are arranged according to age and swimming ability. Because the pool is unusually deep in the shallow end, it is recommended that the children be seven years of age before starting in the beginning classes.

A swimming class for adults will be offered in the afternoons.

Registration for these classes will be on Friday, June 9 and Saturday, June 10, until noon at the high school. Classes will begin on Monday, June 12.

## New Regulations Given For Operators Of Rooming Houses

Under a new amendment to the OPA's Rent Control regulations applying to hotels and rooming houses, operators of such businesses who previously were compelled to rent less than 25% of their total rooms to weekly or monthly guests, now may be relieved of that requirement when such quarters become vacant, it was announced today by Oscar Sederquist, manager of the Waukegan sub-office, Room 27 Post Office building, Waukegan. However, before being relieved of the requirement, operators must petition and obtain approval of the area rent office.

The new regulations do not permit rooming houses and hotel proprietors to change present terms of occupancy or to evict weekly or monthly guests, Sederquist said. On approval of the operators petition under the new regulations, new conditions are imposed. Only where vacancies occur may proprietors change the tenancy from a permanent to a transient rate. If the tenant remains in occupancy for a period of more than 10 days, he shall be entitled to the weekly rate immediately. If he remains in occupancy for a period of more than 30 days, the tenant shall be entitled to a monthly rate automatically.

## WPB Tells How To Get Twice As Many Free Red Points

A simple list of six ways to save used fats, states the War Production board, will enable housewives to turn in twice as many—and earn twice as many free red points.

Used fats are urgently needed for battlefield medicines, munitions and for other vital purposes.

### List Six Points

- The six ways to double fat salvage are:
1. Save all bits of fat you trim from meat. Once a week melt them down.
2. Scrape pans before washing them. No grease is too black to be of use.
3. Skim steams, soups, and gravies while they cook. Afterwards, chill them and scoop off the fat.
4. Save water in which you cook hot dogs, sausages, and ham. Chill, and scoop off the fat.
5. Save fat scraps left on plates. Melt them down with the meat trimmings.
6. Keep the can—any tin can will do—on the back of the stove where it's handy. When the can is full, take it to your butcher and get 2 free meat points and 4 cents for every pound. Start today!
