cases, changes in boundaries between schools might add a few children at one school and lower the number at another, if such a move is in the best interest of all concerned.

As a larger system would make possible more types of specialized help, the teaching staff as a whole would benefit and such action might serve to raise the morale of the teaching forces. Teachers in the two districts have been working together on many projects during recent years, and the general curriculum in the two districts is basically the same. Thus the consolidation could be effected without any major changes in either curriculum or organization, but at the same time would provide greater latitude in future development.

The Illinois Education association, the organization of Illinois classroom teachers, has recognized for some years that one of the factors that is holding back educational advancement in the state is the multiplicity of small school districts, and that consolidation of these districts is basic to the solution of the state's educational problems. Thus the Illinois Education association is on record as supporting school district consolidation in the state. The Highland Park situation is illustrative of an administratively unsound situation existing throughout the state.
