The Pros and Cons Of Consolidation

The Educational Program Most parents will be primarily concerned with the relationship of consolidation to the quality of our education program. Highland Park is fortunate in having good teachers and good schools, and whether not the districts are consolidated, this higher caliber of teaching must be maintained. Consolidation, however, would give Highland Park one course of study for all of the elementary schools, and a basic philosophy alike for all schools. It is the common practice in most good school systems to outline in general a common curriculum for use in all schools throughout the area. In this way children are assured of the same caliber of program, no matter which school in the system they are attending. At present, in Highland Park, a degree of this has been obtained by meetings of the faculties of the two districts; and it is possible that more could be done along this line.
