Picture Map Geography of Canada and Alaska, Quinn (4-7). Historical background, physical features, the resources and industries of Canada and Alaska in brief, simple text.

Mountain Born, Yates. (4-6). A sensitive, lovely story of a little boy and his friends on a mountain farm. lunge the listener to ask for himself, "Lord, what wilt Thou have me to do?" Rev. 1 cup ground whole orange, pulp and juice
1/2 cup milk
1/4 cup chopped nuts

Cream together shortening and sugar until light and fluffy. Add eggs. Beat well. Add prunes. Mix thoroughly. Sift together flour, baking powder, salt, and cinnamon. Add to creamed mixture alternately with ground orange and milk. Mix well. Add nuts and blend well. Bake in greased loaf pan in moderate oven (350° F.) 1 1/2 hours.
