"The Male Animal," by Elliot Nugent and James Thurber, is a satire on midwestern college life, and a recent complete success on Broadway. It will be presented on Wednesday, Friday and Saturday evenings of this week.

The class plans to see at least two other N. U. productions this year, "The Little Foxes" and "Twelfth Night." They have also made tentative plans to visit the Goodman theatre in Chicago and see a play in that city on Saturday, November 18.

(6) Thanking the chaperones at the close of the dance.

(7) In the case of evening parties. By the preceding Friday noon, the dean of girls must have typed list of all couples for whom tickets have been issued.
