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Biggest Local GOP Vote Seen

SPEAKER REVEALS 5 FABLES OF 4TH TERM

Tells How Foreign Policy Is Costing the Lives of Service Men

An audience of politically conscious men and women interested in the issues of the impending presidential campaign filled the auditorium of the Elm Place school to near capacity last Sunday afternoon to hear an address by Congressman Karl E. Mundt, from the First district of South Dakota.

Congressman Mundt chose as his subject, "The Five Fables of the Fourth Term." One by one he blasted the premise of New Dealism that a president of the United States may succeed himself over and over again without limit. The speaker was applauded enthusiastically as he proceeded with his startling revelations.

Highlights in the address by Congressman Mundt are quoted below:

It is a pleasure to extend greetings to Illinois voters from the voters of South Dakota, who in 1940, cast the strongest Republican vote in the nation, percentage-wise, and who in 1944 again expect to lead the nation in the percentage of Republican votes because out in the west we recognize that this election will determine the issue of whether we in America are to have Government directed by the people, or whether we are to drift into a situation where government will direct the people of America.

It is therefore proper that we scrutinize carefully these synthetic arguments advanced by New Deal spokesmen for extending their rule another four years. I believe that these arguments might well be condensed and identified under the heading of the Five Fables of the Fourth Term Drive. Let us examine these mythical fables:

First there is the fable that Roosevelt merits re-election again because he is the Commander-in-Chief.

This argument ignores the American conception of the functions of a commander-in-chief as outlined in our Constitution. In America, our Commander-in-Chief does not serve as a field marshal after the European concept and does not make the military decisions in the fields of battle. Rather, the Commander-in-Chief deals primarily with home front problems, and nobody seriously contends that we should have military government on the home front.

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Republican Group Headquarters Open

The headquarters is staffed by volunteer Republican workers from all the organizations in Highland Park. It is maintained through the joint efforts of the Deerfield Township Republican Woman's club, the Highland Park Men's Republican club, volunteer workers from the Lake County Republican Central Committee's organization in Highland Park, and contributions and volunteers from the Republican Woman's club of Highland Park. Thus all Republican groups in Highland Park are represented in the venture, and have put their shoulder to the wheel to assist in serving the interests of Republicans in the community. The office will be open all day the day of election, Nov. 7.

Change the Statute Republicans Urged

Republican voters in Lake county are urged to vote yes on the proposition to amend the state constitution to allow county treasurers and sheriffs to succeed themselves. The proposal has received the endorsement of the Republican Central committee, which has pointed out that any time voters wish a change in administration, they have recourse to the ballot box, which makes the ban on consecutive tenures of office unnecessary.

Incumbents in the two offices in Lake county are Sheriff Walter Atkinson and Treasurer Gus Fredbeck, both of whom have done excellent jobs in the posts they now hold.

Church Endorsed By Republican Organizations

The opposition to Congressman Ralph Church is endeavoring to establish a claim that he is the favored candidate of Republicans in Lake county. This is not the case. Mr. Church as a candidate for the Office of Congressman from the Tenth District, has the full endorsement and backing of the Republican Party.

Mr. Chairman: Congressman Mundt, who with other Republican members of the House has consistently helped this nation prepare both for victory and for lasting peace; friends in Highland Park:

First let me say how good it is to be home. Service as your Congressman at Washington at any time — carries a full weight of responsibility; but at this time — when national and international problems tax every resource of a man's experience and capacity, and mind and human heart, — service in Congress demands in every sense that "last full measure of devotion." I know this great Tenth District realizes how deeply at all times I have sought to meet that demand.

Today we gather here, under the earnest and successful Republican leadership of Highland Park as free citizens of a free nation, about to exercise our right at an election (we hope will be kept free) to choose our national leadership for the next four years — the most fateful years in the history of our country and of a weary world.

And I am proud to say that every sign points that this is a Republican year, and that it will be Republican leadership to which America will turn on November 7 because the people know that the myth of Mr. Roosevelt's competence to guide us, either in war or peace, is being rapidly exploded.

I know that incompetence, for from 1934 to 1940 and from 1942 to 1944 you gave me the responsibility of representing you in Washington, and I know at first hand:

1. The New Deal incompetence and chicanery in domestic affairs. Have we forgotten the NRA? Or the blank check appropriations — or the economy of scarcity whereby we slaughtered the little pigs — or the court-packing scheme — or the

4TH TERM ISSUE WILL BRING RUSH TO POLLS

R. W. Schneider Shop Instructor Taken by Death

Last rites were held on Thursday, Nov. 2, at the Masonic temple, for Robert W. Schneider who succumbed to a long illness Monday, at his home at 990 N. Green Bay Road. Funeral services were conducted by members of the Masonic order and Dr. Louis W. Sherwin, pastor of the Presbyterian church, in which the deceased had long been an active worker.

Born in Marathon county, Wis., 61 years ago, Mr. Schneider's whole life was given over to study and teaching. He held the degree of Bachelor of Science in industrial arts awarded at Stout Institute, Menomonie, Wis., and did post graduate work at Armour Institute, Chicago, University of Chicago and Colorado State college. In 1935 he received his master's degree at Northwestern.

After teaching in Sheboygan Falls, Wis., for four years, and two years at Mosel, Wis., he came to Highland Park in 1911, when the high school enrollment was only 200, housed in one building, as sole instructor of the industrial arts department. He watched the enrollment grow to over 1000, and his department to a corps of six teachers, of whom he had charge. He has been a member of the faculty for the past 33 years, having the longest record of service of the present instructors.

American Education Week is designed to call attention to the work that the schools are doing and to renew the understanding of parents in the problems that schools face. The National Education association is sponsoring American Education Week and is using the slogan, "Education — a Mighty Force in the World."

"No house without a pile of paper at the curb" is the salvage committee's slogan for the regular monthly waste paper pick-up from every curb in the city, starting on Monday, Nov. 6, through Friday, Nov. 10.

At no period of the war has there been a more urgent need for waste paper than right now, reports the War Production board.

Too Little Paper in October

Only 18,950 pounds of waste paper were collected in October — a marked decrease in the total of 27,400 pound in July. It is 1200 pounds more, however, than the August pick-up.

Opposition to 4th Term and Federal Dictatorship Spreads Rapidly

A record Republican vote in Highland Park is foreseen by local political observers as the result of one of the most significant presidential campaigns in America's history.

Growing opposition to the Fourth Term and Federal dictatorship has spread to every segment of the community. Such opposition, it is said, will express itself by an unprecedented rush to the polls.

Despite the fact that Highland Park is traditionally and predominantly Republican, local groups have neglected no steps in appealing to men and women who nullify their rights of citizenship by failure to go to the polls. Twenty thousand Republican voters in Lake county did not vote at the presidential election four years ago, it is pointed out.

Among the organizations most actively co-operating with the Lake county Republican Central committee are the Highland Park Men's Republican club and the Deerfield Township Women's Republican club. Both organizations have collaborated in maintaining headquarters for the past month on South St. Johns Ave., opposite the Northwestern depot.

They have sponsored a series of open forum discussions by prominent national speakers which have attracted wide attention. One of these, discussed elsewhere in this issue of the Press, was held last Sunday afternoon at the Elm Place school.

Interest generated by the presidential campaign is paralleled by the contest in the Tenth Congressional district. The candidate who is attempting to oppose Congressman Ralph E. Church, is backed by heterogeneous elements of uncertain political complexion. Claims that he has the backing of Republicans have not been substantiated from any source. Nominally this candidate is a Democratic nominee.

Co. Republican Candidates Are Running Strong

Although only three of the five Republican candidates for county offices have even a semblance of opposition in Tuesday's election, it is expected that the GOP sweep in Lake county will mean that they will roll up totals comparable to those which might be expected as a result of a hot campaign.

L. J. Willmot, veteran circuit court clerk, and Harry Hall, state's attorney, are entirely without opposition. Howard Scott, recorder and Robert Pearsall, county auditor are opposed by candidates who have waged a campaign that at best can be called "quiet." Only Garfield Leaf, candidate for coroner has had any opposition that could be in any sense of the word be called active, and it is taken as a foregone conclusion that his years as a county public servant and his immense personal popularity will ensure a decisive victory for him.

Membership Is Open In Republican Club

As there has been some question about memberships in both the Deerfield Township Republican Woman's club and the Highland Park Men's Republican club, it is hoped this article may clear up some uncertainties.
