### Synod President Will Speak Here

The Rev. William L. Rest, D.D., president of the Northern Illinois Synod and pastor of Immanuel Evangelical and Reformed church, Chicago, will deliver the sermon at a special evening service in St. John's Ev. and Ref. church, Green Bay and Homewood, on Sunday evening, Dec. 3, at 7:45.

Dr. Rest has a wide experience in the affairs of the Church. Besides serving as synod president, he is also chairman of the committee on revision of constitution of the World Service commission; and also serves on the committee of "Crusade for Christ," a nationwide program for the revitalizing of present church membership and enlisting of the un-churched into active membership.

Dr. Rest is a graduate of Elmhurst college and Eden Theological seminary. He studies abroad in the Theologische Schule Bethel bei Bielefeld and at the University of Tuebingen. Elmhurst college honored him by conferring upon him the "Doctor of Divinity" degree in June, 1944.

This is the first time in the history of St. John's church that a synodical figure has ever occupied the pulpit. Dr. Rest will have a message that will be especially timely for the Church in these times. He has a keen mind and a deep understanding of the greatest business in the world—the Lord's business. The public is cordially invited to hear Dr. Rest.

## Money Contributed for Northwestern Settlement

A special gift of money donations for the purchase of games and new gymnasium equipment will be this year's Christmas contributions of the Highland Park branch of Northwestern Settlement to young people at the settlement house in Chicago.

For many years it has been traditional for the local branch to fill several dozen Christmas stockings with toys, goodies, handknit mittens and caps for little children in the Polish district in Chicago who wanted and needed to believe in Santa Claus. This year's change of plan answers extraordinary wartime Christmas needs as seen by Miss Harriet Vittum, resident head of Northwestern Settlement. Miss Vittum believes that additional recreation for restless young people under service age is more necessary now than Christmas stockings for small children who are not so deeply affected by the maladjustments of war.

"Holding onto boys and girls just under draft age who are eager for adventure and the unknown, is the greatest problem confronting welfare workers today," Miss Vittum emphasized in addressing the local branch recently.
