This year's change of plan answers extraordinary wartime Christmas needs as seen by Miss Harriet Vittum, resident head of Northwestern Settlement. Miss Vittum believes that additional recreation for restless young people under service age is more necessary now than Christmas stockings for small children who are not so deeply affected by the maladjustments of war.

"Holding onto boys and girls just under draft age who are eager for adventure and the unknown, is the greatest problem confronting welfare workers today." Miss Vittum emphasized in addressing the local branch recently.
