The Little Giants led by a wide margin at the quarter, but the lead was soon narrowed, and Kenosha led at the half.

The frosh-soph, after leading most of the way, lost another close game by a score of 40-43. Ernie Malizia was the high scorer with 19 points.

Increase Needed in Sale of Christmas Seals

Unless returns from the sale of Christmas Seals increase at a greater rate than at present, purchase of the proposed mobile chest x-ray unit is doubtful, according to Miss Orpha L. White, executive secretary of the Lake County Tuberculosis association. The modern unit would enable the association to take mass chest x-rays at industrial plants, schools, lodges and other places.
Lake county will have to nearly double its seal sale of last year to purchase the \$21,000 unit for use in its tuberculosis control program. Last year the seals brought in \$27,000 for use in carrying on the work in the county. That amount, plus the price of the x-ray unit, means that nearly twice as many seals must be sold.
So far the seals have brought in \$15,425.92. Receipts are somewhat ahead of those for the same date last year, but not far enough to indicate that the purchase of the unit is assured.
Miss White is anxious to see Lake county again take the lead for the state, outside of Cook county, to retain the trophy won last year. The award must be won three years in succession if the trophy is to remain in the hands of the association.

Technical Future For Boys Seen

Parents of boys will be interested in the report just published by the United States Office of Education which takes the view that new developments in electronics, air transportation and automobile design, as well as creation of improved materials for textile, food and construction uses, will demand a large increase in trained technical personnel. The report states that about five trained technicians are needed in modern industry for every professional engineer. These technicians fall into four main categories: Engineering and science aides requiring a year or two of pre-employment training; narrowly trained specialists such as inspectors; production and maintenance supervisors, and semi-technical salesmen, accountants and like workers.

December 20, 1944

MEATS, FATS — Red stamps A8 thru Z8 and A5 thru S5, good indefinitely. No new stamps until Dec. 31.

PROCESSED FOODS — Blue stamps A8 thru Z8; A5 thru Z5, A2 and B2 remain valid indefinitely. No new blue stamps will be validated until the first of next month.

SUGAR — Sugar stamps 30, 31, 32, 33 and 34 each good for 5 lbs. indefinitely. Stamp 40, good for 5 lbs. canning sugar thru Feb. 28, 1945.

SHOES — Airplane stamps, 1, 2 and 3 in book three good indefinitely.

GASOLINE — A-13 coupons in new ration book good for four gallons thru Dec. 21. B-4, C-4, B-5 and C-5 coupons good everywhere for 5 gallons.

FUEL OIL — Period 4 and 5 coupons remain valid thruout the heating year. Period 1 coupons remain also valid thruout the heating year.
