Now for the climax - "Victory in the Pacific." With the allies or the offensive in the Southwest Pacific and the drive for the Philippines and China Coast moving rapidly, Aloha Baker's lecture more than ever is vital to a better understanding of our war strategy.

Mrs. Baker is an American whose education was completed schools in Beigium, France and Italy. She has lived in 85 foreign countries and speaks six languages. This, together with years in the field of exploration, has given her a background of authoritative information.

Since Pearl Harbor she and her husband, Walter Baker, have devoted their talents toward the production of films that familiarize Americans with the war effort of their allies in the Pacific, Mr. Baker acting as editor and producer.

Their pictures dramatize the vital stepping stones our troops are pursuing in winning their way to Tokio. They show our American fighting men in action in New Guinea, Rabaul, Australia and the Netherlands East Indiies. They make it possible for us to witness the Japanese defeated in a stupendous sea battle, whipped by a superior air armada. They show the Japanese outmaneuvered and outfought in the steaming jungles. Paratroop attacks, seaborne assaults and aerial conquest will be made real.
