Efrem Zimbalist Plays At Orchestra Hall Sunday

One of the most famous names in the musical world today is that of violinist Efrem Zimbalist, who will appear in recital at Orchestra hall on Sunday afternoon, Feb. 25.

Zimbalist began his professional musical career when he was nine years old. He ran away from his Russian home in Rostov-on-the-Don to a nearby town where an Italian opera company was playing. After hearing the boy play, the opera director immediately engaged him and that evening the audience was amused to see the most important post of the orchestra, that of concertmaster, occupied by a boy whose feet scarcely touched the floor.

Zimbalist first appeared in the United States over 30 years ago and has been an American citizen for many years. He has undertaken two world tours and many more than that in Europe, the United States, Canada, Cuba and South America.

Since 1928 he has been head of the violin department of Philadelphia's Curtis Institute of Music and in 1941 he was appointed director of the Institute. He makes an annual tour of the United States, presents a recital every year in Carnegie hall, is heard at least once each year at New York's Lewisohn Stadium as well as at the Philadelphia Dell, and appears frequently as guest artist on major radio programs. He has composed for violin, piano, voice, chamber groups and orchestra. He has conducted the Chicago Symphony and the Philadelphia orchestra. He can play any number of musical instruments and can talk on almost any subject from books to jade, from chess to politics.

The program Zimbalist has selected for Sunday's recital is a varied one including Vivaldi's "Ciaccona," Ysaye's "Ballade" for violin alone, "La Clochette" by Paganini, and three Chopin compositions, a "Necturne," "Valse," and "Mazurka." Two features of the program will be Brahms' "Sonata in D minor" and Ernest's "Concerto for Violin and Piano." Tickets are now on sale at the box office.
