### Demand for Teachers At Fort Sheridan STU

Civilian teachers are urgently needed at the Fort Sheridan Special Training unit, which trains educationally deficient soldiers in meeting minimum requirements of the army, according to Col. George H. Cushman, Fort Sheridan post commander. Without this schooling, many men, physically fit and in the age group most needed by the army at this time, would not be available for service. Over 7,000 soldiers have already graduated from the Special Training unit and are now serving on every corner of the world. Women with teaching experience in the primary grades may join this project which helps men serve their country as well as prepare for a more useful later civilian life. The salary offered is \$2,433 yearly. Teachers work from 7:45 a.m. to 4:45 p.m., six days per week. Applications should be filed with the Civilian Personnel office, Fort Sheridan.
