Funeral Services For Fred C. Glader

Last rites were held on Wednesday for Fred C. Glader, 21 S. Green Bay, who passed away on Monday after a lingering illness. Interment was made in Deerfield cemetery.

Mr. Glader was born in Highland Park 67 years ago. His parents, natives of Germany, settled in this locality before the Civil war.

At one time he was employed by the Chicago and North Shore railroad as engineer of their power plant, and later as engineer of the local waterworks. He retired from business 20 years ago.

Some years after the turn of the century, "North Western's" Ralph C. Richards delivered an address before a group of employees. His subject was, "Conservation of Men."

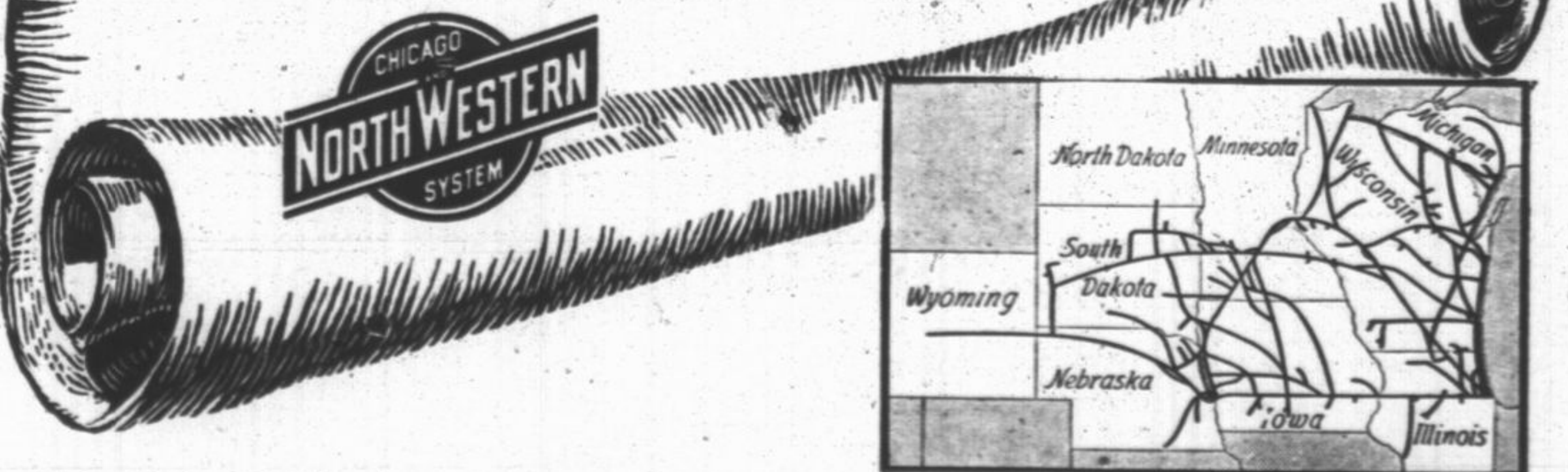
