Rabbi Stephen Wise to Address Jewish Congress

Rabbi Stephen S. Wise, internationally-known Jewish leader, now in San Francisco as a delegate to the United Nations conference, will be the guest of honor and chief speaker at the eleventh annual spring dinner of the Chicago division, American Jewish congress, which will be held on Sunday, June 3, at 6:30 p.m., in the grand ballroom of the Stevens hotel.

More than 1,500 plates have already been reserved for the dinner at the Stevens, where Rabbi Wise will speak. The occasion honors Max A. Kopsetin, prominent member of Congress and one of its former presidents who has contributed ten years of his time and energies to the promotion of this organization's ideals. Max Brossler currently is president of the Chicago division.

Dr. Wise is president of the American and World Jewish congress, chairman of the Zionist Emergency council, president of the Jewish Institute of Religion, and founder and Rabbi of the famed Free Synagogue in New York City. He is acknowledged the mouthpiece of American Jewry, as well as their outstanding champion.

child welfare work, done at the Lake Bluff orphanage and at the Soldiers and Sailors children's home at Normal, Ill. This money provided children's parties, clothes and spending money for the youngsters "adopted" by the local unit. The rehabilitation work among veterans of both World War I and World War II has been done at Dwight Veterans hospital, Dwight, Ill., the Veterans craft exchange, Chicago, and Veterans hospital No. 105 at Downey. Downey hospital, situated at Great Lakes, is visited often by members of the auxiliary, and at the request of Dr. Goode, superintendent of the hospital, ping pong tables, basketball sets, records, a piano and drapes for the recreation room were purchased at a cost of \$280. These articles are all planned to aid in the treatment of patients, some of whom have been at the hospital for more than 25 years.

Through the courtesy of the Public Service Co., a number of articles, made by veterans are on display in the store window. Some were made by handicapped veterans in their homes, and put on sale by the Veterans craft exchange, and others were made by patients in the occupational therapy shop at Downey.

this year was to learn what activities the community wanted and then to fit the program to meet the needs. In addition to the results of the questionnaire certain recommendations made by last year's playground staff will be taken into account in the planning of this year's program.

The plan is to establish two summer playground programs. One is to be located on the newly improved Ravinia school playground, and the other at Sunset park. Each will be properly staffed with regular and special playground instructors. Playground activities will include the following: athletic—games, sports, hikes, bike trips, picnics, informal games, tennis. Arts and crafts—woodcraft, leathercraft, drawing and painting, nature craft, and the like. Informal—dramatics, story hour, singing and the like.

There will be a weekly Wednesday day camp to be held at Sunset park where children will bring lunch and participate in a day of camping activities.

In addition to the two main playgrounds there will be activities conducted at other schools and playgrounds, as the need indicates.

Playschools will be conducted at Elm Place, Lincoln and Ravinia schools. These informal playschools for boys and girls 5, 6 and 7 years old, provide expert leadership for morning or afternoon periods. There is to be a small charge for this activity.

For the "teen agers" there will be a weekly "open house" and dance at the Community Center—as well as twilight softball, baseball and tennis.

The Playground and Recreation

board is preparing a bulletin of its summer activities which will soon be available and distributed among school children in Highland Park.

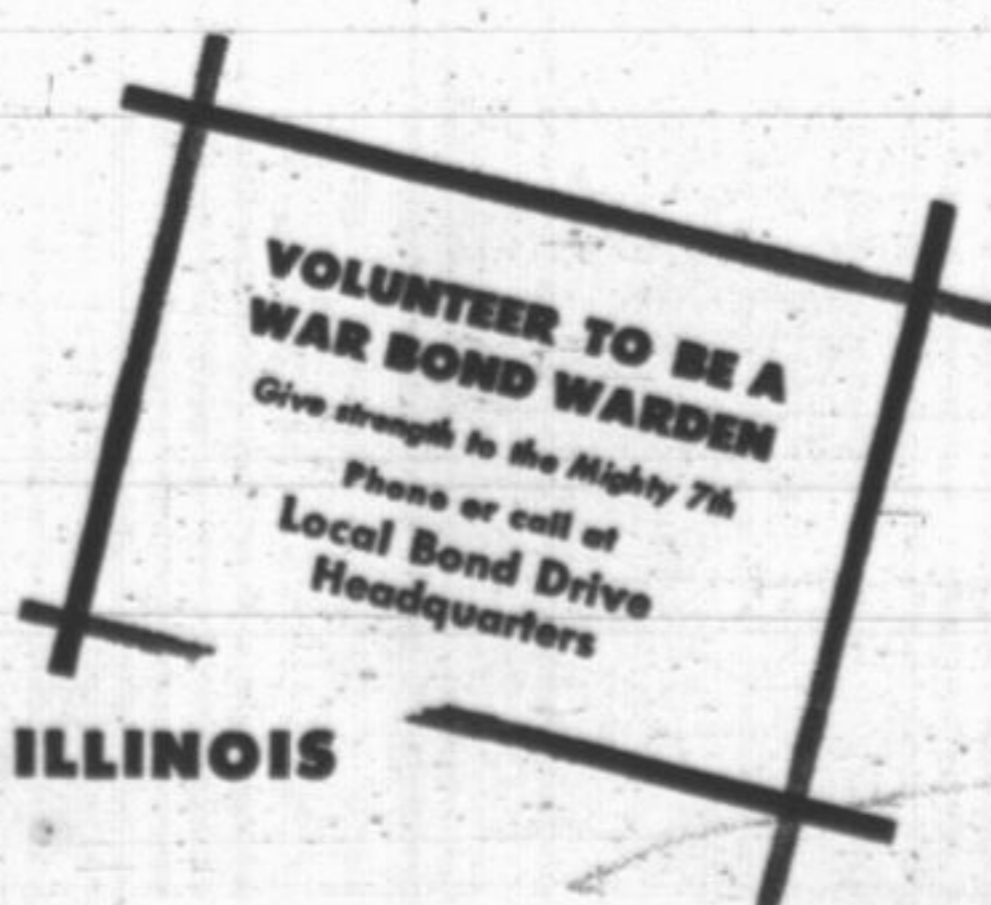
