Vallee O. Appel and Frank F. Selfridge Honored by Chicago U

Two Highland Park men, Vallee O. Appel, president of the First National bank of Highland Park, and Frank F. Selfridge, 27 Linden avenue, were among the 33 distinguished alumni of the University of Chicago awarded citations of merit at the alumni assembly on Saturday, June 9, on the Midway.

The citations, established during the university's fiftieth anniversary celebration in 1941, are given in recognition of public service to the community, the nation, and humanity. Since their establishment four years ago, citations have been awarded to 218 university alumni. This June nine women and 24 men received citations.

Mr. Appel, '11, is a past president of the Alumni association. A practicing lawyer in Chicago from 1914 to 1917, Mr. Appel became a first lieutenant in the infantry during World War I and served 10 months overseas. On his return, he became a trust officer in the Great Lakes Trust Co.

In 1922 he became president of the Fulton Market Cold Storage Co. in which capacity he is still serving. He is first vice-president of the Chicago Mercantile exchange and a past president of the National Association of Refrigerated Warehouses and the American Warehousemen's association.

At present he is chief consultant on refrigeration to the United States secretary of war and a member of the advisory committee on refrigerated warehouses to the War Food administration. He attended Harvard Law school from 1911 to 1914.

Mr. Selfridge, '16, is president of two hospitals, Provident Hospital and Training School association and Highland Park Hospital foundation. During World War I he served with the army of occupation.
